Yearly dues for MPCClub memberships are:

1. \$4.00 Regular membership for an adult.

2. \$7.00 For a married couple.
3. \$2.00 For any member under 21 years of age.

4. \$2.00 For any member of the Armed Services.

Now that you are in a checking mood - you might as well write your check to cover another year in United States Chess Federation. Please pay these dues through your club treasurer as a percentage goes into the club treasury. It costs no more and both you and your club will benefit by your thoughtfullness.

Yearly dues for USCF memberships are:

1. Regular - \$10.00 (\$19 for 2 years; \$27 for 3 years.)

2. Junior - \$ 5.00 (Under 21 at expiration date.)

3. For other types of membership i.e. Sustaining or Life, see the latest issue of CHESS LIFE or your Secretary.

Membership in USCF, required in all USCF rated tournament play, will include subscription to CHESS LIFE, eligibility for USCF rating, the privilege of purchasing books and chess supplies at discount prices.

USCF is a non-profit democratic organization, the official governing body and FIDE unit for chess in the United States. Anyone interested in advancing American Chess is eligible for membership. We need your help to improve the standing of the USA in international chess.

Did you know that the total number of possible moves in a game of chess is so huge that a googol* is quite trifling in comparison? Despite the googols of possible variations, chess is a fairly easy game.

A googol is defined, by Kasner and Newman's Mathematics and the Imagination (Simon and Schuster, 1940) as 1 followed by 100 zeros.

The Monterey Peninsula Chess Club's Spring Triple-header Rating Tournament roared to a crashing climax Thursday, May 16. In the Alpha division all games were played except one.
