Summer Rating Tournament: Tournament Director Frank Sutor has announced that the MPCClub's summer rating tournament will be seven rounds swiss, starting at 7:30 p.m. Thursday August 15, at the Casa Alvarado Chess Center, 494 Alvarado Street, Monterey. Entrants must be members of, or join, USCF at time of registration. Entry fee 52. Trophies, prizes and awards will be presented to the winners of various classes. Players must record each game and submit a copy to the TD. Time limit will be 40 moves in 2 hours. Bring clocks and sets. Players should advise the TD ( 372-4987) that they intend to play. Fee may be paid at the tournament site.

Rapid-transit tournament: Lightning Chess Champion, Jerry Wollschlager, of Fort Ord, crushed all opposition to win the prize for the July Rapid Transit Tournament held at the Casa Alvarado Chess Center and directed by Ted Yudacufski. Ted and Gene Newmann tied for second in the A section. The B section wimner was Mike Hartmann, while Chuck Nystrom and Jim Kilcrease tie for second.
