SIR ORACLE PEEPS INTO THE FUTURE

What Will Be the Fate of Chess? -- Some Reflections Occasioned by Recent Prophecies of the Turn of War

It is unlikely that Chess will survive the Age of Unrest, quite untouched. For Chess in its 400-year-old form does not represent fin-de-siecle War. Its activities are on one plane. (2) Nothing of the destructiveness of modern implements is adumbrated.

Directly one Nation destroyed another by a sudden sky attack, mimicry of the elder feudal warfare would become meaningless, wouldn't it? Our Game might then be relegated to the primitive remote corners where bombs and gassing, airplanes and tanks did not enter.

In such an era an adequate War Game would have an uneven terrain with plenty of hazards; key posts instead of squares disputed for possession; pieces of swifter mobility and larger powers; above all, a ceiling that would control to a large extent the proceedings below.

It is not suggested that the private person would take such a New Chess field into his home. But Master teams could vie in panoramas and auditoriums before vast crowds looking spellbound at the mimic representation of the ways of War...Games are like lore and often sturdily stand 500 years behind the Times. When, however, those days get too old and knights no longer sway and bishops are outmoded and kings and queens are figurines and castles meaningless, what will the answer be? Won't Invention get busy over the new instrumentalities?

Forgive us, Standpatters, if we have spoken out of turn. We love our present Chess, Morphyism, Steinitzism, hyper-modernism and all. The latter has taught us how to "dig in" and how to practice "remote control." Nevertheless we cannot but feel that it is a state of transition from the old feudal Attacks of the classical game to some new revolutionary concept.

We venture to predict that Chess will not "stay in the trenches" throughout the next fifty years. Straws in the wind to that effect are that the Russians have renamed their Pieces after the new martial instruments and the Peruvians already conduct their War Chess game in three elevations --below, the submarine; above, the tank; in the ceiling, the airplane.

RESHEVSKY, NEW CHAMPION, ON TOUR OF AMERICA

Under the management of Hermann Helms, 150 Nassau St., New York, U. S. Champion Samuel Reshevsky is making his first transcontinental tour since he won the title. He hopes to visit all the places in which he exhibited as a Child Prodigy 15 years ago, and a good many more.... He was last seen on the West Coast in 1932 when he shared third at Pasadena with Herman Steiner and Arthur Dake. In the intervening four years he has become an international figure and a logical contender for World nonors.... The set price of \$50 each for his Exhibitions is not high when the costs of being a Grand Master are considered. In addition to the fee, Reshevsky asks his transportation expense from the preceding "date."

At that time contestants are asked to turn over the scores of any unfinished games to the Calif. captain, Henry MacMahon, 9441 Wilshire Blvd., Beverly Hills, Calif., or Illinois captain, Montgomery Major, 215 Ninth St., Wilmette, Ills., respectively. (NOTE: - Don't leave to the Opponent the task of doing this. We want both sides' scores. Decisions can be more quickly reached thus.) By March 1, then, the Match should be fully wound up.

With the Point score standing as of October 26 CALIFORNIA 147 - ILLINOIS 65, the probable outcome disappoints Illinois officials who had expected a mid-western victory. They are game, sportsmanlike losers, and it is only fair to state that California's overwhelming superiority is largely due to the many defaults on the part of Chicago 'board-players' who lack Correspondence stick-to-it-iveness. Nevertheless, very many excellent games have been played, and acquaintances and friendships cemented that will far outlast the 18 months' term of the Match. Let's have good active play the last two months!

In addition to the perfect scores of Fred Cook and E. C. Green mentioned in the last issue, some other notable completed scores are: For Illinois, #2 Carl R. Wood 4-2 and #3 Wm. Youngquist 5-1. At the end the score stood Borochow 1 - Factor 1. Each had a marked advantage in his partie conducting the White pieces. Therefore by agreement both parties were drawn, as it would have taken months additional to complete the slow endings....Here is Mr. Borochow's A Game in which he successfully managed the Vienna Opening vs. the Illinoisan's classical defence.
