M. I. KNIGHTS CINCH A DIVISION CHAMPIONSHIP - PRECITA VALLEY SLIPS, HOLDS B LEAD

The Mechanics' Institute Knights cinched the A Division championship of the San Francisco Bay Area Chess League on May 10 as they easily defeated the University of California 7-0. California lost before the match started as they forfeited four boards. Addison, Bagby, and Bourke won their games to make it a clean sweep. At the same time and place (Mechanics' Institute), the M. I. Bishops and Oakland were playing nip and tuck and drew a match  $3\frac{1}{8}-3\frac{1}{8}$ . Boyette and Murray struck blows for the Bishops while Trenberth and Lien scored for Oakland. Three boards ended in draws: Plock-Demos, Nieder-Talcott, and Wreden-Bergman. The Castle-Golden Gate match was postponed to May 17, but Golden Gate cannot hope to catch the Knights so will be playing to look better as the second place team.

In the B Division, Precita Valley has slipped, losing to Alameda 2-5 on May 3, but still holds a game lead over Mech. Inst. B and Alameda with one round to go on May 17. Mech. Inst. B swarmed over Mission 5-2 to keep pace while Mech. Inst. B/1 merely showed up to win its match with Golden Gate by forfeit, 7-0. The final round on May 17 matches Precita Valley vs. Mech. Inst. B/1, Mission vs. Alameda, and Golden Gate vs. Mech. Inst. B.

Silver Jubilee Match

25TH NORTH-SOUTH TEAM MATCH AT HOTEL CALIFORNIAN, FRESNO, SATURDAY, MAY 31

The 25th, Silver Jubilee, Northern California-Southern California team match will be held over the three-day holiday weekend at the Hotel Californian in Fresno, May 30, 31, and June 1. The North-South match itself will actually begin at 9:30 am on Saturday, May 31. Registration for the match will be from 4:00 to 7:00 pm on Friday, May 30, and a last-hour registration period will be on the same date from 11:00 to 12:00 pm. In other words, the lineups will be closed at midnight before the match.

Because it is the Silver Jubilee of this historical chess match, a special program has been scheduled. On Friday, May 30, at 9:00 pm the regular business meeting of the California State Chess Federation will take place. A luncheon for wives will be served in the Polynesian Room at 12:30 pm on May 31 and there will also be a tournament for wives with prizes at stake. There will be an informal cocktail hour in this same room at 6:30 pm on the same day. A victory banquet will take place after the match (7:30 pm) in the Empire Room; \$5.00 per person will cover this celebration. The State Speed Championship (rapid transit—ten seconds a move) Tourney will be on Sunday, June 1 with registration time at 10 am and play beginning immediately after.

The South won for the 2nd consecutive year last year 37-36 and Captain Charles Henderson is optimistic enough to predict three straight for the South. Captain Guthrie McClain is out to stem the tide, and hopes to do it with manpower. We know the South will have a 100 players--, let's outnumber them, Northerners!

The annual Mar Del Plata classic was won by the young international grandmaster from Denmark, Bent Iarsen, who scored 12-3, losing only to Oscar Panno. The United States representative, William Lombardy, lost no games, but only got second place as he won 7 games and drew 8 to compile an 11-4 score. Lombardy had a chance to tie it all up in the last round as his opponent was the winner, Iarsen, who was ahead by one point, but the game ended in a draw. 3-4-5 were Eric Eliskases, Oscar Panno (who was favored to win the tourney), and Raul Sanguinetti, all with  $9\frac{1}{2}-5\frac{1}{2}$ . 6th was Herman Pilnik, 9-6, 7th Jaime Emma, 8-7, and 8th Hector Rossetto,  $7\frac{1}{2}-7\frac{1}{2}$ . Oscar Panno, winner at Bogota, was knocked out of contention in late round losses to his Argentine compatriots, Pilnik and Rossetto. Lombardy was the only player to go through the 15 rounds undefeated.

If I remember correctly, you told me that you should play as many opponents as possible.... Wait a minute--, I'm not getting tired of seeing your face every night--; it's just that every game seems to run through the same positions game after game. Postal chess is so slow and besides, I would like to win a game---, just once.

You shouldn't have taken me to that chess club last night---; they made me feel so inadequate. Moves that seemed satisfactory against you turned out to be plain murder. One of my opponents announced mate in two, but I couldn't see it and made my move. I still can't figure out what he was so peeved about. And those guys that were always looking over my shoulder--; gee, they must really be good. But, they made so much noise discussing the next move that half the time I found myself moving without thinking. Those two using that two-faced clock got me, too. Can you imagine, taking two hours to make only forty moves? I played six games last night and half the time I was watching what was going on in other parts of the clubroom.

Yes, those thoughts run through the mind of a neophyte the first time he enters that inner-sanctum called a chess club. Please bear with us, our new found friend. Some of us have been attending chess clubs for years and years, and at times, we forget what it was like when we first started. The trials and discouragements piled upon our shoulders before we, too, won a game now and then. Many's the time we would quit, or mentally threaten to quit and try some other pastime in hopes we might do better. Ask any of us about the first chess prize we won. We'll gladly give you all the sordid details. Most of those you saw in that clubroom have passed the point of no return and are completely under Caissa's spell. A pause now as we bow to our noble queen.

Very few of us have, somehow, retained that golden quality called leadership. We must excuse this sin against Caissa for someone must keep us in line, keep us loyal, and to turn the lights out on us when the hour gets late. Occasionally you will meet a devotee who has nerves of steel, patience of a lion stalking its prey, and has ice-water in his veins. Don't ignore this friendless chap, for every group leans heavily on its champion. His victories become "our" victories. Our leaders, too, are usually equally friendless, for they must stand firm on their impartial decisions, no matter who gets hurt, and create nothing but enemies while doing good jobs.

Most clubs are plagued with a clown. Somehow, this life of the party strays in and stays and stays and stays.... No sooner than he moves on to greener pastures then one of his "brothers" replaces him and the rat race starts all over again. The chronic complainer rates only this mention.

Don't give up hope yet... Miss Eloise Blied of San Francisco has possibly set a record in futility.
