

UHLMANN WINS AT HASTINGS; PORTISCH 2ND

At the annual international Christmas
-New Year's Tournament held in England,
23-year old WOLFGANG UHLMANN strode thru
the opposition undefeated, scoring 8 win
and 2 draws.

LEONARD W. BARDEN, England's wellknown theorist, who has been authoring a
series of articles on the openings in
the CHESS CORRESPONDENT, trailed them
all. Perhaps a detailed knowledge of opening theory is not quite as important
as the will to fight in both the middle
game and ondgame -- a trait we have noted to be lacking in contemporary British
Masters with a single exception, of
course, of the amazing C. H. O'D ALEXANDER, England's only FIDE International
Grandmaster.

A reasonable example of "fighting chess" was displayed in the RADOICIC- IN FUSTER game, which endured 18 hours and 138 moves.

OLAF ULVESTAD ROLLS UP A 6-0 SHUT-OUT! 50 SET RECORD IN WASHINGTON STATE OPEN

Last year a record 38, this year a spectacular 50 players entered the annual (non-USCF-rated) Washington State Open Championship held in Seattle January 24th-25th! West Coast Ratings were used to pair this 6 round swiss in the Seattle University Lounge.

Does practice help? Only last November, we reported ULVESTAD scoring 52-2 to win the Central Washington Open in Yakima. Also in that tournament DR. DAVID GROENIG and OLIVER W. LA FRENIERE both scored 4-2. All three players this time improved their final tally in a 6-round-swiss by a full half point! A coincidence, you say?

For those of you who have a copy of MCO-9 (Modern Chess Openings, 9th edition, 1957), ULVESTAD is the same fellow who worked out that analysis on page 18 for the Two Knights Defense.
He is also a rated USCF MASTER (2253).

Tournament Directors AL LIVINGSTON and BUZ EDDY did a tremendous job! Al was handicapped with the flu on Sunday but played as well as directed so the number of entrants would be even, thus avoiding Byes. Buz mimeographed the complete cross-tables and sent a copy to each player in the tournament within three days after its conclusion!

OFF THE CHESST - George W. Flynn

A few quotes from a British Broadcasting Corporation talk by Leonard W. Barden.

"A mark of the weak player is to make premature attacks with a few pieces before making sure that all the pieces are properly coordinated. An early excursion with the Queen is one example. The sound general rule, therefore, is to bring all the pieces into play before starting the attack.

"One of the most frequent troubles of the club player is that he does not know

what kind of move to look for once the opening is over.

"It is inadvisable for most of us to try to play a large number of openings. The best idea is probably to have one opening (as White) which you know really well and which is fundamentally sound -- whether it is the Ruy Lopez, the Queen's Gambit, etc. With Black, you should have one main defense to the king's pawn and one to the queen's pawn.

"If a new move does not seem to have any obvious refutation, you should try it out; in practice, the surprise value usually outweighs any slight unsoundness."

Barden suggests that you study master games which begin with your favorite opening to find out the kind of middle-game strategy you should follow.

I wonder if anyone has ever made a list of famous Westerners who were chess-players? General Vallejo of early California played chess, for instance. Does any of his games survive? Also I recall reading that one of the French champions served as vice-consul in San Francisco about 1850. Perhaps he might have played Vallejo. Is there a historian in the house?Or should I say, "Is there an historian in the 'ouse?"

Don't you think we sometimes take our chess too seriously and forget that it should always remain a game? What I mean is that I have often lost sleep, tossing and turning for hours, analyzing my mistakes and proving to myself that I really should have won the game I lost earlier in the evening.

Have you ever done that? Well, it seems to me that we have to figure on losing games and making mistakes. If we win all our games, I think it obvious we are playing far below our strength. Shouldn't we be glad there are players available who can defeat us and thus allow us to play our final best?

Or is that too much Pollyanna? Well, at least it's an idea, as the man said

who always began his game with 1. P-Q5.

If you were suddenly given a million dollars, would you continue to play chess? Of course you would, and that's the real proof of the enduring value of our game. To coin Flynn's Basic Law of Chess: "Chessplayers play chess, no matter what."

And, to conclude, let me confess that the happiest hours of my life have been those spent playing chess and winning. The next happiest? Playing chess and losing.

GAME PLAYED IN A TEAM MATCH between Berkeley and Hayward on 16 December 1958. Game No. 51

Another chess swindle perpetrated. After playing the first twenty moves in exemplary fashion, White unaccountably falters and loses the game when a simple blocking move, 21. R-Q6 maintains his great positional advantage and should win easily.

White: Art Willis (B) Black: Robert A. Karch (H) KING'S INDIAN DEFENSE

1. P-Q4	N-KB3
2. P-QB4	P-KN3
3. N-QB3	B-N2
4. P-K4	P-Q3

A waste of time. Better is 6....QN-Q2 or 6....P-B4, then if 7. P-Q5, P-QR3.

7. 0-0 QN-Q2 Could try 7....N-R3.

8. P-QN3 P-Kh Black is at a loss for a suitable continuation. The text creates more weaknesses in his position.

9. PxP

Opening the file is to White's advantage. PxP

9. Slightly better is 9....N/2xP. 10. B-R3 R-K Q-B2

11. Q-B2 12. QR-Q B-B

Necessary to prevent 13. B-Q6 which threatens to win the KP by forcing the Queen back to Q-square. If the Queen attempts to avoid that move it risks being trapped.

13. B-N2 N-BL 14. P-QNL N-K3 15. P-QR3 B-N2

16. KR-K

White refrains from trying to win the KP as 16. NxKP is countered by 16....NxP or 16....QxN; 17. N-Q5, QxB; 18. QxQ and Black wins 3 pieces for the Queen.

16. B-Q2 17. P-B5 QR-Q 18. B-BL N-05

Black loses patience. This is not a sound sacrifice. Better is 18....B-QB to prevent 19. R-Q6 and invite exchanges.

> 19. NxN PxN 20. RxP N-N5 21. R-Q3?

This loses quickly. The only move here is 21. R-Q6. Then is 21....B-KL; 22. P-R3. If 21....B-B4; 22. P-R3 and if 21....B-Q5; 22. R-K2.

21. OxPch 22. K-B N-Kh1 The most forceful move. 23. R-Q4 Q-R8ch

Black has a choice of moves: 23.... NxB; 24. RxN, B-K3; or 23....N-B6.

24. K-K2 B-N5ch 25. K-K3 QxRch 26. N-K2 B-R3ch

Or 26...NxBch. 27. P-B4 BxN 28. BxB Q-N6ch 29. K-Q2 BxPch

30. K-Q Q-K6 31. Q-B3 RxRch 32. OxR QxQch

THE CALIFORNIA STATE CHAMPION "JINX" is on again. It is a nice title to achieve but it apparently "jinxes" the champ when it comes to the team matches. This reporter remembers when the then State Champ GIL RAMIREZ of two years ago couldnt win a single game during the team match season. CHARLES BAGBY appears to be the victim of the champ "jinx" this year as GUTHRIE MCCLAIN scored a win over him in the Castle-Knights match February 7. Only JAMES SCHMIDT, last year's champ, was able to overcome the "jinx", tho he started out slowly that year with a couple of early round draws.

There is much activity to report now around the BACL and your reporter could go on and on, so here's an attempt to brief it down to the most interesting occurences. The Chinese New Year Parade again had its influence on a team match. The captain of the Mech. Inst. B Team, BOB KARCH, was delayed not only by the parade, but by an accident on the Bay Bridge as well. The Precita Valley produced a line up and punched their clocks at 7:45 p.m. and this was considered a mean thing to do. But-last year the shoe was on the other foot when a few members of the P.V. team were delayed by the Chinese New Year Parade. The Mech. Inst. B Team at that time demanded a lineup when the P.V. captain was missing or forfeit the match. The M.I. Team sat down and punched their clocks as P.V. hurriedly made a lineup with what men they had. Starting out 2 points behind and a few minutes behind on a few clocks they managed to salvage a draw and went on to win the championship! This year Mech. Inst. B didn't start out minus 2 points but they were behind on all clocks, however Precita Valley fell apart and Mech. Inst. B won the match (and the championship?).....

There is much pro and con about the West Coast Ratings, but here's an indication. After a team match was cinched, one member of a team said to a fellow member, "The match is cinched--, you're only playing for your rating points now!" From such remarks as these, the indication is that players do care about their West Coast Rating.

A MAJOR REVISION IN THE RATINGS SYSTEM??

It's being considered. Numerical ratings would be abolished and players would be Master, Expert, A, etc. A classification, once earned, would be for life. But, -- advancement will be based on a 60% or better record against those in the next higher class. The minimum would also be 20 rated games within two years.

A TWO-WEEK CHESS VACATION AT THE BEGINNING OF AUGUST

The bus will leave from San Francisco to Los Angeles (409 miles), with stops enroute to pick up passengers in Oakland, Modesto, Fresno, Bakersfield and Los Angeles. The route can be changed to provide the greatest convenience for the majority of the passengers.

From Los Angeles the shortest route will be taken to Omaha, Nebraska (1,683 miles). To reduce the time on the road and travel expenses, the bus will continue without stopping, except for meals and to change drivers every ten hours.

The entire trip from San Francisco is expected to take 49 hours. We will have at our disposal a standard, Greyhound highway bus equipped with air-conditioning, individual reclining seats, and outside baggage facilities. Seats will be reversible and collapsible tables will be supplied to accommodate those who wish to play enroute.

The regular round trip fare direct to Omaha (from either San Francisco or Los Angeles) is \$73.59. However, the bus has to travel an additional 409 miles down the California coast so that the normal charter bus savings is wiped out. The fare will be \$75.00 round trip, payable in advance (by July 1st). Thirty-two (32) paying passengers are needed.

Hotel accomodations may also be reserved. These hotels are centrally located in Omaha:

Arrangements can be made for those wishing to double or triple with other chessplayers who will also be taking the trip.

The precise dates of the U.S. Open are not known, but an advance report indicates it will be either from August 3-15 or July 25-August 8. The bus would then depart San Francisco on August 1st or July 23rd.

To paraphrase current business advertising, mailing a postcard does not obligate you in any way and no salesman will will call....

Wouldn't you like to see the looks on their faces when the California Bus pulls up at the U.S. Open? Imagine the psychological effect on the players themselves!
