NORTHERN CALIFORNIA-SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA CHESS MATCH AGAIN AT FRESNO, MAY 31ST

The 26th annual Northern California-Southern California chess match will be held at Fresno on Sunday, May 31st, starting time at 10:00 a.m. A 75-board match is hoped for, though the record turnout is a 73-board match in 1957--, it was a 63-board affair last year. The Northerners hold the edge in the series, having 15 wins to the Southerners 7, there being 3 ties. The records through the years are presented here for those interested in statistics.

The North will have a tune-up match (San Francisco-East Bay match) on Sat., May 23rd, at the Mechanics' Institute in San Francisco at 7:30 p.m. The South also holds a Rebels-Yankees match for a tune-up.

CHESST Flynn George W.

This month's column is dedicated to a letter of interest from Paul Leith of New York. It is quoted verbatim starting with "Dear Mr. Flynn:

I was very much interested in the item in your column (Chess Herald, February)

concerning famous Westerners who played chess.

Thinking that I might come across the name of the French chess champion who served as vice-consul in San Francisco about 1850, I ran through R. N. Coles' column "One Hundred Years Ago" in the issues of the British Chess Magazine back to January 1955 (that's all I have), but no go. But I did learn that Charles H. Stanley, considered the strongest player in the United States from 1846, when he beat Rousseau in New Orleans, to 1857 when Morphy rose to the heights; was "an Englishman from the British consulate in New York" (issue of Nov. 1957).

Unfortunately, too little has been written about the history of chess in the United States. Fred Reinfeld summed it up, beginning with Morphy, in three articles in Chess Review (1946). "Benjamin Franklin and Chess in Early America: A Review of the Literature" by Ralph K. Hagedorn, Philadelphia, University of Pennsylvania Press, 1958?, prints Franklin's "Morals of Chess" and extracts from some others of his chess writings. I believe he should've given all of Franklin's writings on But the author, a librarian, devotes most space to a bibliography of chess books published in the United States down to 1859, revealing new discoveries since Fiske's famous bibliography, included in his "Book of the First American Chess Congress".

By Alfred C. Klahr, Middletown, N.Y., 1934, "Early Chess in America" is a scanty 20 page pamphlet, with almost half devoted to the missing Rou document, written in

"Chess in Philadelphia" by Gustavus C. Reichhelm, Phil., 1898, 158 pp. is a splendid book, with biographical material on outstanding players of the city, club tournament results, simultaneous exhibitions by Steinitz, Zukertort, and other famous masters, as well as the results of tournaments from London 1851 to Cologne 1898.

"A Short History of Chess" by U.S.A. medical doctor, Henry A. Davidson, a splendid little work, gives the names of U.S. Champions, and only one page to chess in America. As to the earliest origins of chess in the Western Hemisphere, he quotes Benjamin Franklin who wrote in 1786: "Europe has had chess over a thousand years; the Spaniards have spread it over their part of America; and it has lately begun to make its appearance in the United States" (from Morals of Chess). This may come as a surprise to many of your readers, but it may furnish a clue to research on early chess in California. The California State Library and the California State Historical Society (especially early documents in Spanish) may provide the clue. And here, your living in the state capitol may prove an advantage.

SOUTHERN CALIF. CHESS LEAGUE WINNERS

The Van Nuys team won the Class I championship, scoring 42-2 match points and 15 game points. Runner-up Long Beach tallied 4-1 and 13.

Inglewood topped a ten-team section, Class II-Fast, with 72-22 and 362. Long Beach tied Downey at 62 match points but the former nudged ahead with 34 game points to 30%.

Class II-West, also ten teams, had a first place tie at 8-1 between the Van Nuys-1 and Santa Monica-2 teams which was resolved by a single game point! Van Nuys-1 did it with 392 game points.

Van Nuys also had a winning team in Class III! Here they racked up 6-2 and 29 game points. Pasadena was 2nd.

The top two teams from the East and West sections will soon meet for a Class II play-off. (Can Van Nuys win again?!)
