

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### TEAM MATCH RESULTS

As this goes to press it looks like Colle defeated Evens 5-1, Alekhine leads Max Lange h-1 with one game turned in for adjudication, and Botvinnik leads Keres 3-2, a game in this match also up to adjudication.

It all means that the Summer race in the El Camino Real League is mostly between the Showalter and Colle teams. Showalter at present leads with a 1-1 match score and a games record of 20-10. Colle's match score is 3-1 and a games record of  $13\frac{1}{2}-10\frac{1}{2}$ . If there is a match score tie then the games score is used to break the tie so it looks close.

Showalter has one match left, versus Alekhine here at the Precita Valley Chess Club next week, August 9th. Colle has two matches to play, versus Keres and a make up match versus Max Lange.

White: Paul Bogosian (Showalter) Black: R. Chroninger (Max Lange) COLLE SYSTEM

1. P-Q4 P-Q4 2. N-KB3 N-KB3 3. P-K3

White intends to play the Colle System so postpones the fight for the center until he has brought his King into safety.

B-N5
Better is the variation 3..., B-B4; 4.
B-Q3, P-K31 introduced by Alekhine at San Remo, 1930.

4. B-Q3 P-K3 5. QN-Q2 P-B4 6. B-N5ch

Since the Eishop is already developed and P-B5 is no threat, 6. P-B3 is better.

6. . . . N-B3
This makes White's lost tempo profitable. QN-Q2 is the correct move.

7. BxNch PxB
8. P-B3 PxP
9. BPxP B-Q3
10. 0-0 0-0
11. Q-K1 Q-R2
12. P-K4

A premature thrust that Black does not meet properly.

12..., PxP; 13. NxP, NxN; 14. QxN, BxN wins the Rook Pawn or 14..., B-KBL with advantage.

13. P-K5 BxNP?

A bad bargain. B-R4 saves the piece and whether White captures Knight or Bishop he is a Pawn down with a bad development.

14. KxB N-N5 15. PxB QxP 16. N-B3 P-QB4 17. P-KR3 N-B3 18. B-Q2 PxP

Black ignores the threat. He has a lost game but 18..., N-K5 would at least leave the way open for possible White errors.
