THANK YOU, NOEL, for allowing me to be guest annotator. Actually I think Jim Cook should share your GAMES SECTION this time since he knows his own games well (as I do mine). However, this does give me a chance to make notes on games besides my own. As a matter of fact, I wasn't even around when these games were played. This, in other words, is my first attempt at analizing games other than my own for any publication. It is fitting that these two games are played by one of our co-champions and in the section of our club periodical edited by our other co-champion. Needless to say, I respect both champions!

The following games were played at San Quentin -- , one of them counted but I fail to remember which one. At any rate, I feel they are both well played.

Came No. 15

Something new? Not exactly. This could be called the start of the KINGS INDIAN IN REVERSE favored heavily some two years ago by Larry Evans, former U.S. champion, against most any kind of defience selected by Black. It is sort of a Vienna variation except that in the Vienna White plays 2. N-QB3 rather than the text. Also it leads into the CATALAN SYSTEM of the Reti Opening in some cases. 1. ..., P-QB4 being the characteristic move of the Sicilian it remains as such regardless of what White chooses to play.

. . . Now White does use something new! This move was first introduced against the Sicilian by Alappin vs. Macrozy at the turn of the century, but played as

White's second move. It temporarilly drove the Sicilian Defense into the storage closet. Through the years, however, the Sicilian has had a habit of coming out of storage with new variations. One of these times was the early 1930's and in 1932 Alekhine came up with the text move on a defferred 3rd move, i.e. 1. P-K4, P-QB4; 2. N-KB3, N-QB3; 3. P-B3! Again the Sicilian was driven back to storage. In recent times the Sicilian was revived again, popularized by the new "Dragon Variation", but Alekhine's old defferred P-QB3 (among other new lines for White) seemed to knock it out. The object of the Sicilian, of course, is to stop White's center, but P-QB3 by White, in most cases, seems to offset this theory. Perhaps Mr. Cook's even later P-QB3 will once again put the Sicilian in moth balls!

P-K4 4. . . . Black already seems to be demoralized. With the text he weakens his QP which I'm sure will become a target later for White. N-B3 was called for or he could even resort (as a try) to the Dragon Variation (P-KN3 followed by B-N2).

Believe P-Q4 immediately would have been better here since that is the idea behind White's P-OB3.

And the weak OP falls and as you can see in the following moves White knows what he is doing as the rest becomes easy. We can't blame Black for failing to see the fact he would loose a Pawn with his 24th move, giving White a very strategical passed Pawn.

Space not permitting to go into explicit details (though such would be instructive in the following game), I will only make these remarks on this game. It seems Jim Cook must keep a lot of company with Gil Ramirez, Calif. champ and "open" champ. His first move as Black indicates such as Gil once advised yours truly to try the move 1...., P-K3 vs. 1. P-Q4. I call it a sort of "hurry up" Nimzo-Indian Defense except that Black plays 3...., N-K2 instead of the usual N-KB3. Knowing what I do about this particular approach to White's 1. P-Q4 I am inclined to call it the RAMIREZ DEFENSE. Outside of saying the end game is interesting I'll let you readers play out the game.
