SACRAMENTO CHESS NEWS

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March 22, 1952

As the evidence of this bulletin in hand testifies, we have not folded up altho our last issue was on Jan. 17th. The whole difficulty can be explained in those devilish words "Form 1040". Yup, old income taxes had us almost down, and there just wasn't enof hours in a day to get out a chess paper along with all the tax work. But we are back on the job now, and hope to have a paper out every 3 weeks.

Many thanks to all of you, in other towns as well as locally, who have turned in game scores and news items for publication. If your particular item is not in this issue, it will appear shortly, as fast as we can publish them. And now that the CCCL matches are over, don't let down on your efforts but continue to send in

scores and club news. We can't print it unless you send it in!!

Perhaps the biggest item of local news is the new meeting place for the Sacto Chess Club. The Tavern became crowded, so we have moved to the Clunie Hemorial Clubhouse on Alhambra Blvd, meeting time 7:30 PM each Wednesday night. This is a fine meeting place, and visitors are always welcome. The big difficulty with the Clunie as a meeting place is that there is no place available to store our large suitcase full of equipment. This means lugging it to chess club and home again each week, which is quite a chore. Austin has suggested that we auction off the chessmen and boards, keep the clocks in a smaller suitcase, and let each member bring a chess set. This would not be a bad idea inasmuch as several members already do bring chess sets. In fact Ye Ed would go further and sell off the whole works and let a member bring his own clock if he so wished. Let's hear from the rest of you.

At last report, condition of Treasury rested at \$92.12. There have been no unusual expenses, \$7.06 for membership cards, a few dollars for postage is all. Then with dues collected, and our weekly kitty thrown in, we now have \$115.54 in the club treasury. But don't forget to drop a quarter into a kitty each week at club, as we now have a weekly rental charge of \$1.50 to meet, and the excess goes against the cost of this paper. And after all, two bits isn't much for an evening of chess!

The Sacramento Chess Championship Finals is an upset so far. Gee threw away a piece against Richards, who now leads by 4-0. Meyer is second with 3-1, having drawn two games. There are two more rounds of play, with Richards-Meyer as one of these. Anything can still happen, and probably will. In any case, Russell and Gee are not in the race as of now. So Sacramento will have a new man at top board in our next season's matches. So the rest of you teams had better look out. We hope to have a fuller report on the tournament for the next issue.

BOOK REVIEW

The World's Great Chess Games, by Reuben Fine. Crown Publishing Co., \$4.00
This is a selection of the best games played by the world's great masters from
Philidor to the present day. It contains over 100 annotated games plus over 100
final combinations from still other games. The book is divided into eight sections;
From Philidor to Morphy, The Age of Morphy, The Age of Steinitz, The Age of Lasker,
The Age of Capablanca, The Age of Alekhine, The Age of Euwe, and The Age of Botwinnik. The last section contains a treatment of contemporary American masters. Each
section contains games from the great players of the period, with a preliminary discussion of each player. Nearly all the great games and players are included. There
are some notable omissions. One could wonder at the inclusion of Winter, and some
present American masters, while such men as Gunsberg, Mason, Teichmann, Mieses, and
Miss Menchik are omitted. This reader would like to have included the Lasker-Napier
game at Cambridge Springs 1904. However, these are minor objections.

The author has generally been very fair in his discussion of the controversial figures such as Alekhine, and Capablanca. He has striven to produce quality and quantity at a reasonable price. The book stands midway between liest The Masters (Euwe) and Golden Treasury of Chess (Wellmuth). It covers more ground with less exhaustive notes than the former, but less ground with more notes than the latter. It should be a welcome addition to most Chess Libraries. — By Neil Austin.

COMMENTS by Flynn

Two matches won by the Forty-Niners-Stockton & Modesto. Say, what's come over our team? We are certainly stronger now than at any time in the past. The matches were hard-fought on individual boards and, altho we racked up quite a score, there was no player on either side who didn't realize he'd been in a reall chess game. San Jose, however, keeps rolling along. It looks as though they have the championship in their back pocket. Still, there is yet time for a surprise.

These matches are peculiar. On some days a team just falls apart; on other days, it seems as though that same team can't lose a game. Perhaps San Jose owed it success to the fact that it seldom hits one of those off days. One or two players for San Jose may fluff their games, but the remaining players always make up

for it.

I didn't get to the Stockton match so I missed seeing my old friend, Mattingly. But, at the Modesto match, I got a good look at all the games. Lee Kerfoot was there, and battling hard. Come to think of it, I don't think there's a player in our League who is better liked by one and all than Lee. And not only in our league. In the Correspondence Chess League of America, Lee Kerfoot has friends all over the country and is always good for 150 to 200 votes for any office. Mebbe we ought to run Lee in this hyar Presidential campaign coming up in November. He'd deliver the chess vote in one big bloc.

The two Herbs, Paul and Betker, were also in their glory, showing pawns for Modesto. For two years now, I've meant to compliment Herb Paul on his discretion as Team Captain. It was two years ago that Krogness was fighting a losing ending against R. E. Russell. It was 6 pm and all other games were over. Both Krogness (a bitter fighter in the end game) and Paul agreed the game was a loss. Which was true, but it takes two gentlemen to admit it, when it costs your team a point.

Oddly enough, R. E. Russell was again involved in a similar situation in this year's Modesto match. Only this time he was in the losing position. Sacramento repaid the courtesy two years later. Altho a pawn up, Russell and Neil Austin could see no win in the position for Sacramento. The game was adjudicated a win for Modesto's Monty Jackson, and neither Russell nor any Sacramento player objected to the decision—altho it sure hurt to lose that game.

Herb Betker, I understand, is in the restaurant business. We'll all have to stop and eat at Betker's place when we visit Modesto. Maybe we could throw a real chess party there—with Lee Kerfoot as Master of Ceremonies. By the way, Lee never has favored us with that simultaneous exhibition we've been teasing him about for years. Austin and I still think it's a good idea; but Kerfoot says he has all he can do to handle one game at a time.

Just got back from a trip to Boston via non-scheduled Airline and some day I'll have to give you all the lowdown on that business—probably save you money and grief. But right now, let me tell you that Boston has nothing on us in chess. We have as good players in our valley league as I found back there.

I did run into one minor master (leave it to Flynn to hit the tough guys). His name is Jacobs and he plays for the Boylston Chess Club. He is a famous problemist and, say, can he play chess!

Really, I don't know whether he's a minor master or not. Reminds me of the little boy in the Army Captain's suit, who saluted a real Captain. The Captain told the boy to run along, sonny. And the lad ran crying to his mother.

She told him, "Listen sonny. By me, you're a Captain. And by you, you're a Captain. But by Captains, you're no Captain."

By me, Jacobs is a minor master.

lst Board Roy Russell missed a win against Monty Jackson, then missed it again, and finally missed the draw. J. B. Gee won a fast game from Herb Paul, when Paul allowed a Rishop to be trapped. Team Captain Austin was overly optimistic against the veteran Lee Kerfoot, and lost a pawn. In a position with plenty of play for both sides, Lee offered a draw, which was accepted. Milt Meyer won a pawn from Herb Betker, but Betker resigned somewhat prematurely, perhaps out of respect for his gifted opponent. Richards and Celle were ahead all the way, altho both games were among the last finished. S. Applegate played his second successive draw, his only draws in over twenty matches. Bob Burger and Dr. Janushkowsky were too strong at the low boards.

Our next match will be against Oakdale at Modesto on March 17. Jeff Smith's boys have not been able to get going this year, but will be out to redeem themselves. If we win this match, we will have a good chance for 2nd place.
