The 1953 Fresno Board One Qualifying Tournament has just been concluded, with Phil Smith and Mike Hailparn finishing in a tie for first place with like scores of $5\frac{1}{2}$ - $1\frac{1}{2}$. The affair was a round-robin with eight participants.

The surprise of the tournament was Bob Womack who finished third (on S.B. points) by beating Smith and drawing with Hailparn. We always knew that Bob had the potential but this was by far his finest tournament.

The only player who went undefeated throughout the tourney was Hailparn but he gave up one draw too many and had to settle for a tie for first place. According to pre-tournament agreement a three-game match is being played between Smith and Hailparn, the winner to play board one in the remaining league matches.

Sacramento Club Championship 1953-54

With 17 players in the tournament, a preliminary qualifying Swiss system tournament of five rounds is being played. The top 8 players will compete in a round-robin for the Championship, while the other 9 players will engage in a Consolation Turney for suitable prizes. Leading players after three rounds are W. Hartley, who defeated Gray and Bender, and drew a bye; C. Iverson who defeated Janushkowsky, drew Meyer, and gained a forfeit from O. Celle for $2\frac{1}{2}$ - $\frac{1}{2}$. Gee has $2\frac{1}{2}$ - $\frac{1}{2}$, winning from Lacey and Austin, and drawing O. Celle. Five players are grouped with 2-1: Janushkowsky, Austin, Keith, Clawson, & Bender. Meyer and O. Celle follow with $1\frac{1}{2}$ - $1\frac{1}{2}$. With two more rounds of play, anything can happen. Upsets have been occurring with alarming frequencies.

WHAT IS A CHESSPLAYER, ANYWAY?

Scholars, great thinkers, educated men, and even chessplayers have asked this question. What is a chessplayer, anyway? The research group that said "Dibs" on Dale Flahr's brain (they're still waiting) have asked that question. Gerald Abraham asks it in his new book on the chessplayer's mind. The manufacturers of mathematical calculators seem to be the only ones who claim they are not mystified. Apparently they haven't witnessed a Central California Chess League match, say, Fresno versus Sacramento!

Be that as it may, a chessplayer has been described as everything from a delicate artist to a ravenous demon. I think it was Larry Evans who recently stated that a chessplayer, or a master, at any rate, must have a killer instinct, while Rossolimo sighs poetically, "we are all artists." The nationality of the chessplayer makes little difference, though Reuben Fine has noted that in all ages there have been a surprising number of Jewish players, while the trend has gone from German to American to Russian. As for the occupations of players, who can tell? If there are a lot of lawyers, it may be only because they had to do something to pass the time at law school.

What does a chessplayer look like? Does he have the fresh, angelic look of a Mike Hailparn, or the haggard aspect of an Al Loera? Does he hover over the board, vulture-like and calculating as a Gilt Meyer, or is he a Jeffers, playing intuitively fast and loose? (Any resemblance... is purely co-incidental....)

What the answers are can only be imagined. If the masters are supposed to be "killers" by instinct, what of the late Bogoljubov, who played through two World Championship matches almost for the fun of it though deserving of a more solid role in Chess History? Spielmann's artistry must have emanated from some unique vitamins in the hops. And in our own little world of Chess mastery of the Valley, most players seem to enjoy a combination of fellowship, civic pride, pawn-grabbing, and what have you? as much as any other aspect of the Royal sport. But I think we'll have to practice such things as stomping out of the tournament room, challenging the tournament director in gruff tones, and in general raising the royal roof, before we catch up with the rest of the Chess world on matters of etiquette and "extra-tabular" technique!!

Well, one more matter remains: does the chessplayer ever indulge in (I shudder at the very thought of the word) ...Chess problems? If he does, he's been keeping it to himself for the most part, for Americans are fast becoming notorious as problem-solvers.

I suppose we'll never know - or want to - what a chessplayer is and what makes him tick. All we know is that another full schedule of matches and tournaments is beginning for the accountants, teachers, doctors, students, steelworkers et al of the Valley, all of them being chessplayers par excellence. Whatever became of the George Flynn suggestion that each team carry a moniker a la Sacramento Senators? We could have the San Jose Dons, the Stockton Vinos, the Fresno Orange-eaters, etc. (just kidding, Stockton and Fresno!). What about it? The Pittsburg aggregation will enter the arena unofficially as the Bull-fighters, or the Foreign Legion (among other gratuitously given titles). "We challenge you one and all, from Frank "Gross-killer" Einberg to Gabriel "here's-Your-Horn" Garcia.

And any spectator, wandering into the match room unawares, will have no doubt about what a chessplayer really is.
