Digest that for a while. There were 173 in the main tournament, and 24 in the Booster Section, chiefly held for youngsters. This is the largest turnout for a locally-organized tournament in California - topped only by the U.S. Open in San Francisco. Chess is on the vane up again since May, when the first-time held John Gilbreth Memorial Open in Long Beach drew a top crowd of 80, above usual for a first event. And now the Patific SW - hurray for Santa Monica, who attracted a good number of new and unknown players for the event.

The winner? No other than young Jim TARJAN, who has just won the California Junior title in June. Jim is now back in New York playing in the U.S. Junior Championship - at the age of 16, there's no telling

where he'll go. Only even farther stars are ahead of him.

TARJAN won the event with a clear sweep of 7-0, ahead of KIRBY, WEINBERGER, REMLINGER and others. We have not received the complete crosstable, which would take up three pages, but will publish it as soon as we can. We believe it will be of real interest to all to see who's all been there.

Of course now those of you who had their appetites whetted have a chance to show your stuff at the ERNEST SHIELDS OPEN in Bakersfield on this coming weekend, July 19-20-21.
