In spite of it all of course, everyone had an enjoyable time, and we thank you for attending. The southern players outnumbered the north by a good margin, and all the Fresno players and one from Visalia were loaned to the North to even out the match.

ALSO AT FRESNO....Our congratulations to the new CALIFORNIA STATE RAFID CHAMPION, Irving RIVISE, who, playing in top form lately, topped a field of nine finalists qualified (three men per section) from three preliminary sections of nine men each. The man Irving received top prize of \$25, while \$15 and \$10 were pooled and split by secondplace tiers John BLACKSTONE and Duncan SUTTLES. The section qualifiers were:

Section 1: Duncan SUTTLES, Arthur SPILLER, Harry BOROCHOW. Section 2: Irving RIVISE, Karl STANI, Gordon BARRETT. Section 3: David BLOHM, John BLACKSTONE, Martin RUBIN.

The C.S.C.F. meeting was held after the North-South match on Sunday afternoon, postponed from the night before, and produced few new determinations. One decision will affect you, however - shortly you will receive a copy of the California Chess Reporter, containing a questionnaire on YOUR preferences involving the various state events. Be sure to answer this survey, so we can improve things for you.

All events were held at the Towne & Country Lodge, which did not meet our usual required standards. The California Open on the Labor Day weekend will be back at the Hacienda, in their new, spacious Arcade Hall which is equipped with beautiful lighting for chess (the one big complaint so far). So be sure to plan to attend, and make your reservations NOW - with another convention - completely undisturbing for us - scheduled for that weekend, you may have trouble getting a room in the last minute. So reserve soon - reservation cards available from your editor upon request.

## SUTTLES REPEATS AS CALIFORNIA 30-30 CHAMPION

He did it last year, and this time defended his title in great style - Duncan SUTTLES allowed only one draw to Irving RIVISE, who finished second, and took top honors with 5½-½. He will hold the State 30-30 title for a long time to come, as this event won't be repeated for a few years anyway - until we have another 3-day Memorial Day weekend.

RIVISE was a clear second, 5 - 1, drawing with David BLOHM as well as Suttles. BLOHM lost to SUTTLES and tied for third with Dr. F. RUYS at the 4½-1½ mark. Other prizewinners were: Dr. RUYS, Expert Prize, Karl STANI and Ron PEASE, tie for Class A, Manuel TUPAS, Vlass B, and HALL and BLACKMAN, rie for Class C. A good tournament, with 27 entries - slightly less than last year.

Happened to spot the name of an old friend of local circles recently...still going along in his winning ways. The Arizona 30-30 Open, played in late March and early April, was won by Imre BARLAY without losing a game....

Fourteen entries in the Expert Candidates at El Segundo, where we have only a first-round report and not exact details. Six out of seven games were won by Black. Players include Dennis LITTRELL, Henry CILLERS and promising youngster Alex GOJICH.....

At City Terrace's Expert Candidates Section, fifteen players

are fighting for top honors, with Jerry WOLLSCHLAGER, Irving BESEN, Sam JURADO, Robert KOTZ, David ARGALL among the better-known contenders..... At SAN BERNARDINO high-flying Tim DELANEY took the Club Championship with a score of 62/2, ahead of Steve SKRYPZAK and Forrest SMYTH, 4½-2½. Play was a round robin of 8.....And at RIVERSIDE last report had Greg HERLICK in the lead in their Club Chapionship, with 6-0, ahead of DELANEY, COTTEN and SKRYPZAK. This one is a 14-man round robin!
