Calif. players; the California Women's Open naturally excluded male entrants; the Monterey Park Novices Tourney was limited to those rated under 1750; and the Riverside Open catered more or less for all toose in-between. Our heartiest congratulations to William ADDISON for retaining the title of California Champion, which entails the keeping of the Champion-ship Trophy for another year. A great showing indeed - ADDISON lost only one game, to "eo KUFERSMITH in the second round. After that he followed with a series of wins and just one draw to MARTIN, assuring him of the title after eight rounds! A draw in the last round to "ohn BLACKSTONE gave our champion the excellent total of 7 - 2. The crowning achievement of steady, good chess throughout.

Ray MARTIN, clear second with 5½-3½, was helped by fate somewhat to attain this sole position. In the last round, both WEAVER and CUNNINGHAM had a chance to bypass him by winning or tying him by drawing, but this was not to be. The long-shot chances of MARTIN winning, WEAVER and CUNNINGHAM both losing kept MARTIN on top of the field by ½ point.

CUNNINGHAM played brilliant games one after another, but also lost a game to BLACKSTONE which involved a Queen-sacrifice brilliancy against

him. His style is vivid, exciting and enterprising.

WEAVER, Minnesota Champion, is a newcomer to the California scene, and jut in an excellent performance. His last-round loss to KUPERSMITH

was a heart-breaker, while being a heart-lifter to his opponent.

BLACKSTONE lost two points against his fellow-northerners to start with, and did well to end up fifth ona come-back trail. Roy HOPPE also showed tenacity, was in frequent time-trouble and many adjournments tired him somewhat. KUPERSMITH, the dark horse of the tournament, was the only one to defeat ADDISON, and MARTIN as well -- in fact, he scored 3 out of 4 points against the first four finishers - a formidable achievement indeed. Steve MATZNER was erratic, obtained only ½ point from the top five finishers, which hurt him. Irving RIVISE, California Open Champion, was off form, drawing too many games, lacking the over-pressure type game he showed at Fresno. Max WILKERSON was outclassed, though he has a win against RIVISE to his credit.

All in all, a great tournament, enjoyed by all. Cash prizes were distributed to all the players, first and second prizes being \$150 and \$100 respectively. Directed by your editor, with great pleasure.
