The idea was great, the arrangements fine, the schedule right. Yet, a great number of players apparently did not make it - the CSCF expected close to 150 entries, but got only 79. As such, sections had to be combined; the OPEN took all those rated over 1801, and the second section the rest. It wasn't a true Class Championship, but pretty close and Paul KOPLOY is the officialCalifornia Class A Champion, while Walter HEATON is the B Champ. Rick COWDRY is declared Class C Topman. Crosstable for section 2 overleaf.

What may have hurt is another tournament held in Sunnyvale over the same weekend - especially in light of the fact that only 18 northerners turned up v. 54 southerners. This of course produced an off-balance North-South match score, since all seven Fresnoites were pooled with the northern contingent. (And they got plenty of points too!) The match, reported elsewhere, ended up in an overhelming victory for the North.

The North got their overwhelming points in Section 2, which they won 40% - 19%. In the Open, the South won by a small margin, 18%-16%. The Fresnoites scored 17-7; and the five southern 11-year olds lost 8 points to the North. If we discounted all these, the margin would have been a bare one point! It would take too long to list the results (the Calif. Chess Reporter may do that in their next issue), but here are a few statistics: Vincent SAPORITO of California City was the only player with 6 N-S match games; his score, 3-3. Those with four games (South) include Chris FOTIAS, John HEATHCOTE, ATCHISON, Rick FLACCO and Sam CUNNINGHAM. At the 3 mark, Anna SEMCO, Irving RIVISE.

For the North, several 5-gamers: Alex SUHOBECK, Wm ALLEN, Phil SMITH, WORONICK, Laroy O'DOAN, McCASKEY, C. BAKER; four-gamers, R. BAKER, John JAFFRAY, Rod BOBO, Russell FRETMAN, Ben and Anita GROSS, George OAKES, Dwayne RAIL and PORTER. At three: SEWELL, HEATON, WEINBERG, WOLF and STUART. Of course many with 1 or 2 match games.

The CALIFORNIA STATE RAPID TRANSIT was won by Tibor WEINBERGER, ahead of Julius LOFTSSON, Ross STOUTENBOROUGH and Karl STANI. The tourney was played in three sections, with three qualifiers from each into the Finals. The non-qualifiers played a Reserves Tourney, won by Chandler YERGIN.
