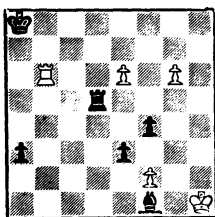

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NORTH VS. SOUTH TEAM MATCH - BACK TO FRESNO!

The 31st annual North vs. South match will be held at Fresno on Sunday, May 31, 1964. The match will be played at the Hotel Californian and will begin at approximately 10:00 A. M. After revisiting San Luis Obispo, site of the match for many years, in 1963, the two captains decided that arrangements at the present time were better in Fresno, the Raisin Capital.

The annual meeting of the California State Chess Federation will be held on Saturday night, May 30th, at a time to be announced. Prior to the meeting - as soon as there are sufficient entries and probably in the neighborhood of 4 o'clock - the State Speed Championship will commence.

The annual meeting may lack the fireworks of last year because the movement towards separation of north and south has lost its steam, but members are urged to attend anyhow. Directors will be elected and there will be a number of important committee and other reports.

GOLDEN GATE CHESS CLUB WINS BAY AREA TEAM TOURNAMENT

The Division A team from Golden Gate won the 1964 team tournament of the San Francisco Bay Area Chess League in a close finish with the team of the University of California. Golden Gate tied for first with U. C. and won a playoff match $4\frac{1}{2}$ - $2\frac{1}{2}$.

CHAMPION STEINER TEAM DEFENDS SO. CALIFORNIA TEAM TITLE

The defending champions, the Masters from the Steiner Club, faced stern opposition in February as the 1964 Southern California Team Tournament began. Perhaps equal to the champions were the Santa Monica and Steiner II teams, but the smart money was on Addison, Rivise, Moskowitz, Pilnick, Lazos and Borocho. The ratings of these players was upwards of 2200. The top rating was Addison's 2450.

ADDISON WINS STEINER CLUB CHAMPIONSHIP by Kyle Forrest

Bill Addison achieved the excellent score of $10\frac{1}{2}-\frac{1}{2}$, and won the attractive first prize of \$250. Julius Loftsson, a promising junior member, earned the second prize of \$150 with a 7-4 score. Jim Lazos was close behind with $6\frac{1}{2}-4\frac{1}{2}$, winning third place and \$75. Fourth and fifth places were shared by Zoltan Kovacs and Charles Henin with scores of 6-5 and prizes of \$37.50 each.

The tournament stretched beyond the scheduled time owing to the unusual number of adjourned and postponed games, and to illness. Irving Rivise was indisposed for over two weeks during the tournament. The reserve section also had its share of drop-outs and adjournments. Two players, Marcos Kerllenevich and David Bernstein, were forced to withdraw before the conclusion of the tournament.

Leo Kupersmith won the first prize of \$70 with the fine score of $8\frac{1}{2}-\frac{1}{2}$, edging out Kack Kliger, whose 8-1 was good for the second prize of \$45. GAME OF THE MONTH

The game between the winner of the Steiner Chess Club Championship and the runner-up was not the spectacular display one would expect for a game of the month. However, it contained examples of at least two of the features of Bill Addison's play which have made him a player of national stature.

First, White characteristically accepts the isolated Queen's pawn, which is a potential end game liability but also a middle-game weapon.

Second, White transposes into a classic Rook and Pawn ending which looks difficult because of Black's active Rook. An incisive Kingside advance, however, soon reduces the Black forces to passivity. This type of clear endgame judgment is the mark of the master.

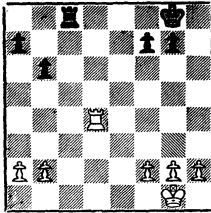
