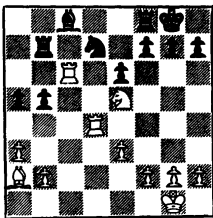

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## NORTH DEFEATS SOUTH, 17-15

The Northern California team defeated an underdog team from Southern California at the annual Memorial Day match, held on May 28th at the Hacienda Motel in Fresno. It was the 34th annual staging of the Blue-ribbon classic of the California chess world.

The first ten boards were divided 5-5 for each side, but on the second ten boards the North scored 8-2 and thereby ran up a scoring edge that was insurmountable. The South was short-handed and borrowed the last five players from the North; here, the South scored 4-1!

The team match was preceded by the Speed Championship, won by John Blackstone and Phil Smith, and the annual meeting of the California State Chess Federation. On Sunday following the team match, the Western Memorial Day Open began; on its conclusion Tuesday, John Blackstone was the winner, followed by a three-way tie for second place between Irving Rivise, Phil Smith and Andy Vinock.

In bygone days the captains used to analyze results statistically. If they were still doing this, they would be disturbed by the fact that Black won on the first six boards. They would then be tempted to take away the White pieces from the losers the next time and give them all Black. This would not achieve anything, for with winner matched with winner, they all can't win!

STATISTICAL REPORT by E. C. Jonas

The 1967 Northern California vs Southern California team match was the 34th in a series which started in 1926. This year's match was only 32 boards, the smallest since 1947. Of the total of 32 games, 14 were won by White, 12 by Black, and 6 were drawn.

The South has won 8 times, the North now 23 times, and there have been 3 ties. A total of 1381 games have been played during this period (not counting a 20-board match between the "second" teams in 1947, won by the North  $10\frac{1}{2}$  -  $9\frac{1}{2}$ ). Total score: North 757-624.

Over the years the North has used a total of 316 players, the South has used 466 and now there have been 42 players who have played for both sides at one time or another. PREVIOUS RESULTS:

ANNUAL MEETING OF THE CALIFORNIA STATE CHESS FEDERATION:

The annual meeting of the CSCF was held on Friday, May 27, 1967 in conjunction with the Banquet. The meeting was called to order by President Isaac Kashdan at the Hacienda Motel at 8:00 P.M.

I. The minutes of the 1966 meeting were read and approved.

II. The Treasurer's report was read by Dr. Ralph Hultgren. The treasury showed an increase from 1966 from \$450.35 to \$704.08 and membership increase from 290 to 359. There was discussion from the floor questioning why California has only 359 members in the State Federation while the USCF has 1457 members from California. The report was accepted and approved.

III. Report Of The Tournament Committee: President Kashdan called upon Gordon Barrett of the Southern California section of the Tournament Committee for a report on CSCF tournaments. Mr. Barrett reported on the North-South match, the California championship and the California Open. The Open for 1966 has the best attendance in recent years: 109 players as compared with an average of about 80 for the four prior

years. Open champion for 1966 was Irving Rivise; State Champion was Charles Henin of Los Angeles.

Rapid transit champions for this year's event were Phil Smith of Fresno tied with John Blackstone of Las Gatos.. Third place went to Dr. Alex Janushkowsky of Sacramento.

Guthrie McClain pointed out that the date for the American Open in Southern California conflicts with the State Championship and requested that some action be taken to resolve this conflict. Thanksgiving is the preferred date for the State Championship.

Mr. McClain also noted that the Junior Championship costs sponsors a considerable sum of money each year. The Mechanics Institute of San Francisco is reluctant to continue donating to the support of this event on alternate years, so it was scheduled for Los Angeles again in 1967. Some decision is necessary about who is to pay costs, where event is to be held and how it is to be financed.

Replicas of State trophy have been made so that each year's winner will have a replica hereafter to have and hold forever, Amen.

#### IV. New Business:

President Kashdan suggested that the calendar for tournaments be projected on a two year basis so that conflicts could be resolved in plenty of time in advance of advertising events.

He also suggested that the Junior Championship scheduled for Los Angeles in 1967 should be held under jurisdiction of CSCF.

An offer was reported from Ernie Shields of Bakersfield advising that that city would like to have a major tournament, a three day event if possible in August or thereabouts.\* He would like to have the event publicized through CSCF. President Kashdan appointed a committee to discuss the event with Mr. Shields.

There was discussion concerning the possibility of making membership in CSCF mandatory for USCF members from California. President Kashdan, John Blackstone and Gordon Barrett were among those who spoke on the subject.

Guthrie McClain reported a proposal from Koit V. Tullus of San Jose for a California Open at the Philco Corporation plant at Palo Alto to be sponsored by Philco with prize donations of perhaps \$1,000 to \$1,500. The offer is not yet definite but might become firm if encouraged by CSCF. President Kashdan instructed the Secretary to prepare a letter on CSCF stationery for signature by Vice-President Blackstone for presentation to Mr. Tullus, advising of CSCF favorable interest.

#### V. Old Business:

There was a floor discussion about the advisability of holding California Open at some location other than Fresno. Suggestions were Monterey, San Luis Obispo, Santa Barbara. After animated discussion, it was decided that Fresno was the best bet.

Another old chestnut was disinterred from the mothballs: The Chess Reporter magazine and its editor were put on the griddle. Mr. McClain listened patiently to the same old complaints about a publication to which he has consistently donated about \$1,000 annually free time plus cash of more than \$100 annually more than he has received. Finally the fire fizzled out and the meeting proceeded.

Following the meeting, Irving Rivise provided one of the most entertaining evenings in the history of the CSCF by showing a moving picture made in Moscow in 1935. It is probably the only comedy ever made about chess and included such players as Capablanca, Spielmann, Yates and other champions.

All directors of CSCF were appointed directors of USCF for the forthcoming year. Additional directors will be appointed by the President prior to the 1967 annual meeting of USCF.

BLACKSTONE WINS PENINSULA OPEN, QUALIFIES FOR STATE FINALS

John Blackstone of Saratoga won first prize in the premier section of the Peninsula Open, held at the Lockheed Plant in Sunnyvale April 7, 8, and 9. Blackstone won his first four games and then drew with Ziad Baroudi in the last round to clinch the title.

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GAME OF THE MONTH

Board One at the North-South Match, always a prestige game for the players selected for this ranking position, lived up to its long tradition of first-rate chess again in 1967.

The opening was sharp. Black pressed home the strategic idea of control of White's Q4 - instead of trying for a quick refutation of 2. P-KB4. With 19...Q-R5, apparently offering his QP, Black gave the game its character. If White had played 20. BxP he would have had to face things like 20...R-K7ch; 21. K-Kt1, and Black can double the Rooks with 21. ...QR-K1 or even play 21...RxB. So White declined the Pawn.

But 22. R-KR1 was simply a retreat from the middle game. It would seem that 22. BxP was satisfactory, but White evidently had confidence in his end game chances - even a Pawn down. As the game went on, White had drawing chances but Black was able to win.

One of the first revelations which one experiences on graduating from neophyte to chessplayer is that the chessboard by its exact size dictates even the simplest endings. Bishops, for example, seem to have the full run of the board in the above diagrams. In No. 261, however, White survives by having just one square to move to in two critical variations. In No. 262 he is able to press Black eternally to the wall. As in most endings, tempo is critical.

In No. 261, my own adaption of an idea attributed both to Regence (Fine) and Centurini (Averbach), White has 1. B-B2!, P-Q7; 2. B-K1! when P-Q8 (R or Q) is a stalemate. If 2...P-Q8(B) then only B-R4 draws, since otherwise 3...B-B7 would force mate. And if 2...P-Q8(Kt) only 3.B-R5! holds everything. If 3. B-Q2, B-B7!; 4.B-B1, Kt-B6 followed by Kt-K5.

In No. 262 Black's Bishop has a sanctuary at R7. White must get his Bishop to QKt8 via QR7, and the Black King must try to guard White QR7 and QB7 as required. So 1. B-R4, K-Kt4; 2. B-B2, K-R3! Now White "Tempos" to lure the Bishop out. 3. B-B5 (not just any square on this diagonal, as we will show,) B-Kt6; 4. B-K7, K-Kt4; 5. B-Q8, K-B3 and now 6. B-R4! and Black must lose a tempo with B-R7; 7. B-B2 etc. The point of 3. B-B5 is that he "pre-empts" this last remaining defensive diagonal for Black - otherwise, after 3. B-Q4, for example, B-Q3!; 4. B-B6, K-Kt4; 5. B-Q8, K-B3; 6. B-K7, B-R7 and Black's King holds the long diagonal.
