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Ernest Shields Open 121-122 NORTH 11, SOUTH 7 AT PISMO BEACH

The Northern California team again defeated an undermanned team from Southern California at the annual Memorial Day classic, held on June 1st at the Veterans' Building in Pismo Beach. It was the 36th annual staging of the North-South rivalry. The team from the South was unusually inexperienced in North-South play, seven of the eighteen not having played before. The South won the top two boards, with Irving Rivise defeating Bob Burger and Sven Almgren defeating Henry Gross, but the lower boards again won the match for the North.

It was the smallest match since 1930. At least part of the reason for the small turnout was a conflicting event, the Ernest Shields Open in Bakersfield, held at the same time with \$1,200 in prizes. Why there was a conflict is a long story. In short, the captain of the South, Gordon Barrett, proposed to hold the match between rounds of the tournament in Bakersfield. There was no interest in this proposal from the North. At the last minute president Kashdan saved the annual meeting by making Irving Rivise the South Captain and holding the event at Pismo Beach. STATISTICAL REPORT by E.C. Jonas

The 1969 Northern California vs. Southern California team match was the 36th in a series that began back in 1926. This year's match was only 18 boards, the smallest match since 1930. Of the total of 18 games, 9 were won by White, 7 were won by Black, and 2 were drawn.

The South has won 8 times, the North 25 times, and there have been 3 ties. A total of 1429 games have been played during this series (not counting a 20-board match between the "second" teams in 1947, won by the North $10\frac{1}{2}-9\frac{1}{2}$). Total scores: 789-640.

Over the years the North has used a total of 319 players, the South has used 486 and there have been 44 players who have played for both sides at one time or another.

MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING 1969 CALIFORNIA STATE CHESS FEDERATION May 31, 1969 at Mattie's Restaurant, Pismo Beach

The annual meeting of the California State Chess Federation was held Saturday, May 31, 1969. President Isaac Kashdan called the meeting to order at about 10:30 P.M.

On motion of Guthrie McClain, the minutes of the 1968 meeting as printed in the Chess Reporter were approved as printed.

The Treasurer's Report, read by Treasurer Ralph Hultgren showed a surplus (estimated) of \$479.13 as compared with \$704.08 the previous year. Membership was reported at a near all-time low of 297, down from 344 a year ago.

President Kashdan and Director McClain reported for the Tournament Committee. Details are printed elsewhere in the Chess Reporter. Their report was accepted.

Discussion of new business was concerned almost exclusively with attendance at the annual meeting and the North-South match. It was conceded that poor attendance and other factors made the meeting and match a fiasco -- which also describes the dinner at Mattie's.

Almost everyone talked on this subject, not always with coherence. The reasons for the declining attendance were generally attributed to the concurrent tournament at Bakersfield sponsored by Ernie Shields and promoted by Gordon Barrett. A number of people blamed them for everything except the weather (which was also lousy).

A resolution was proposed to do something about it all and especially to censure Gordon Barrett. Someone thought that "censure" was too strong a word and wanted to use "deplore". Other amendments changed it to say "unfortunate" or "we go on record" and various other beating-around-the-bush semanticisms. The resolution was carried with some abstentions.

After the vote on the resolution, your Secretary pointed out that he couldn't figure out what the resolution was and asked that it be put in writing so he could enshrine it in the minutes. Since no one else knew what the resolution actually was, the President ordered your Secretary to put it in his own words. Following are the Secretary's own words:

It was resolved that the officials in charge of handling the annual meeting and the North-South match should quit their feuding and act grown up for the benefit of all California chess players. The rank and file don't care who is right and who is wrong and believe that those who wish to fight should do battle over a chess board or go to Vietnam. Nothing will be gained by escalating this feud; in accordance with recent changes in national policy, let's have peace by 1970 or sooner.

This would make your secretary especially happy as he is getting damn tired of having his annual dinner ruined by listening to the annual acrimony. The dinner this year was bad enough without the acrimony.

GAME OF THE MONTH

Team matches produce a surprising amount of good chess. One would think a chessplayer might play harder in an individual event, but whether it's the feeling of responsibility for one's teammates, or the exposure as the teams sit line up on opposite sides of the tables while the spectators mill around, something compels a player to do his best.

MEMORIAL DAY REPORT

The holding of two events on Memorial Day, the time of the North-South Match since 1926, was due to the three-day weekend. The employment of this juicy weekend (from a tournament sponsor's viewpoint) has been proposed for a tournament many times before, but this is the first time it actually happened. This year the proposal was different, however, for the South captain, Gordon Barrett, wanted to strengthen the teams by holding the match between rounds of the Ernest Shields Open in Bakersfield. This would, he reasoned, add players to the teams and would make for a successful annual meeting. Perhaps another tournament would have been acceptable to the North, but there were three things against this one: (1) The distance the North would have to travel; (2) The heat, not only in Bakersfield itself but on the 300-mile trip each way; and (3) The idea of the match becoming a secondary event to a tournament, particularly a tournament named for a person instead of an organization or a city.

During the months from October, 1968, to May, 1969, Gordon Barrett, captain of the South team, Guthrie McClain (this writer), captain of the North team, Isaac Kashdan, president of the California State Chess Federation, and Ernest Shields of Bakersfield were principals in efforts to solve the problem of where to hold the North-South Match. During this period there were misunderstandings, lack of communications, and several lost opportunities to save the situation.

Barrett originally proposed the move to Bakersfield in a letter to me in October. I did not answer the letter until after a telephone conversation with Barrett in December. In both the telephone conversation and the letter I wrote subsequently, I said that the North would not go to Bakersfield. However, the letter was somewhat ambiguous. I was trying to say that I did not answer the October letter because I was busy with the CSCF Questionnaire, and Barrett read it to mean that

the results of the questionnaire might cause me to change my mind. From that time on there was practically no communication between Barrett and me. I thought I had made myself clear, that the North would not go to Bakersfield, and Barrett thought there still was a chance that I might say "yes".

Kashdan wrote me in March that Barrett had asked for a decision as to whether Bakersfield would be the scene of the North-South Match and asked if I had an alternative suggestion. It did not occur to me that I should write Barrett and repeat my "no". Instead, I went to San Luis Obispo to see if we could hold the match there; if we could, then I would have the alternative which Kashdan had asked for. ward the end of March the questionnaire was mailed. As the replies came in it became apparent that the San Luis Obispo area was preferred over Bakersfield by the members, and I so reported to Kashdan on April 7th. Soon after, Kashdan notified me that he and Barrett had agreed that Shields would talk to me, see if I still thought the same way, and attempt to settle the matter by some compromise. This was the last chance to get together. But Shields told me on April 28th that his tournament was already announced and could not be changed. suggested that the Match be moved to another date. I turned this proposition down.

When I reported the conversation with Shields to Kashdan, he saw that there would not be an annual meeting of the CSCF in 1969 unless he appointed a captain for the South and brought a team to Pismo Beach (where I had previously placed a hold on the Veterans' Building) Kashdan authorized me to make a definite reservation on the Building and arrange for a banquet and annual meeting at Mattie's Restaurant, and he drew up a three-day schedule of events and appointed Irving Rivise captain. The whole thing was a last-minute improvisation and with the competition from Bakersfield and the \$1,200 prize fund there it was not a successful event.

At the annual meeting on Saturday night, attended by about 30 members, there was a tendency to resentment about the small attendance and the competing event at Bakersfield. A resolution was passed which "deplored" the competing tournament and when directors were elected for 1969-70 Barrett was not nominated. Barrett thus lost his post as Chairman of the Board of Directors. When the membership went into a discussion of the conduct of Federation events and the mechanics of their administration, it was voted to recommend that the North Tournament Committee be placed in charge of CSCF events held in northern California, such as the California Open scheduled for Monterey this year; thus Barrett was removed from directing the California Open

(for 1969 only; nothing was done about the Open for 1970 which presumably will be held in southern California).

The meeting discussed, among other matters, the following: the low number of members and the failure to require CSCF membership in southern California qualifying tournaments; ways and means of increasing prizes in CSCF events so as to be competitive with local tournaments; and ways and means of reviving the North-South Match and Annual Meeting. A short report on the CSCF Questionnaire was given. The meeting concluded with the election of CSCF directors, which had two major changes: Gordon Barrett was not reelected, and a new area was included on the Board, as Martin E. Morrison of the Central California Chess Association was elected director-at-large for Northern California. Incumbent Directors for the USCF, including Barrett, were retained.

The events described above clearly call out for a tightening up of the CSCF organization. Our constitution calls for administration by the four officers elected by the directors, for the directors to set policy, and for the Tournament Committee to conduct the various events. It seems to me that the Tournament Committee should be an energetic, active body. Yet the Northern Section hasn't had meetings for years and the Southern Section does not even exist. If this committee had been operating during the events related here the conflict would have been over in a short time.

It is likely that a meeting of the Board of Directors will be held at Monterey during the California Open. Let us hope that the acrimony will be stilled and steps will be taken at this meeting to move ahead!






