


#### CHESS NEWS

CHESS FRIENDS OF NORTHERN CALIFORNIA, Inc., visited San quentin March 31, 1956 and engaged in a special team match competition between four SQ teams and four teams from CFNC. These were six man matches and each team played two matches that day with the remaining two matches to be played the end of May. No definite date has been set for the return match. Out of a total of eight matches played, the visitors won 4 matches, lost 2 and drew 2 matches. The total game score being 26½-21½ in favor of the visitors. Many of the games played during these matches will be found in this issue.

PHI DELTA EPSILON FRATERNITY, a group of medical students from the University of California visited San Juentin on April 29, 1956 and engaged in a chess match after first being conducted on a tour of the institution. Out of 15 total games played the visitors managed to win only I game - the final score being 121-21 in favor of the San Juentin club. After the match the visitors were guests of the institution for lunch served in the Employee's Dining Room.

THE BLACK BISHOP chess club of Hayward, California will visit San Juentin on May 19, 1956 and engage in a match on 20 boards. They will first be conducted on a tour of the institution and then will play the chess match, after which they will be guests of the institution for lunch to be served in the Employee's Dining Room. For the most part this group will be made up of high school Juniors and Seniors.

MARIN CHESS CLUB will visit San Quentin Monday evening, May 14, 1956 for a 20 board match.

#### CHESS NEWS

A SwT3S CHAMPIONSHIP TOURNAMENT was started on Saturday, April 28, 1956 by the chess club and a total of 34 players are entered in competition for the local chess club championship. Competition is also for the "B" and "C" class championships with the highest finishing player in each class being champion for the next three months or until the next class championship is conducted.

ELECTIONS were held for the three offices of the chess club and Dave Hansen was again elected club Fresident while Flohr was elected Vice-President and John Nolte being elected club Secretary. The first two offices were decided with only two ballots each while a total of ten ballots was needed to elect a club Secretary!!

NEW MEMBERS admitted during the month of April were: Cabrieles, Hopkinson, Bailey, Hanson, Godina, Switzer and Javor for a total of 7. Six former members quit the club while four others left the institution. New members are being added all the time and those interested in joining the chess club should contact the club President or write a letter to the Supervisor of Recreation, Mr. C. L. SWAGERTY.

CLASS CHAMPIONS were finally decided during the past month with the completion of the last round robin tournament. Carter and Albritton tied for the "B" class title and Mistriel won the "C" class title. Carter then defeated the winner of the "A" class which player has since quit, leaving that class title "Open".

The game totals show that 3nn Quentin has 21½-26½ with the reverse for the visitors. This shows that after two matches the visitors came out 5 points ahead. A half hour of time being available, Gibbs played two skittles games with Mr. Stevens who had won both his regular team match games.

#### CHAMPIONSHIP MATCH

After three and one-half months of play, all class championships were decided and the winners of the respective "A", "B", and "C" classes engaged in a two game out of three game playoff with the winner of the "B" class, Carter, winning the playoffs and thus earning the right to play the present Champion, Hansen, in a six game match. The good showing made by Carter in all "B" class play made him eligible for promotion to the higher "A" class group and he was immediately promoted to the higher class. Carter's play has improved tremendously during the past six months through constant and thorough study so that he now plays Board 2 for the chess club.

The six games of the championship match were interesting and exciting although all of them were played faster than originally intended and thus they contain many grave errors. Annotations of the games will not be given, although general notes will be added to the end of all games to give the reader a better understanding of the games.

At the end of five games Carter lead by the score of 3-2. Since it was absolutely necessary for Hansen to win the sixth game to retain his championship, it was imperative that the game had to be played carefully to prevent Carter from drawing the game and thus becoming champion. By careful play, Hansen succeeded in winning, thus the match was tied at 3-3. Under the by-laws, the champion retains the title on the tie.

Although not counting for the title, four additional serious games were played and Hansen won them all.

Here is the first game of the championship match between Hansen and Carter. It was a French Defense, but opened up quite early through the series of a few trades and both players had numerous advantages at different stages of the game.

The above game was played in a little more than one hour and it is apparent that their are a number of mistakes on both sides. However, the game ended on the interesting side as shown by the position of Black's King.

This is the second game of the match and it is quite easy to see the tremendous advantage that Black gets in the opening only to lose it and the game in grand style.

After securing such a fine opening advantage, Black fails to follow up and makes too many weak and purposeless moves. He gets much too aggressive for the position when it is only necessary to play a normal type game and the win is easy. However, Carter who plays the white pieces deserves all the credit for bringing this game to a decisive ending.

#### PAUL MORPHY'S GAMES

Recognized as perhaps the greatest player of combinations that the chess world has ever seen, Morphy won the chess title of the World at the age of 20 and held it for only four short years, at which time he retired from chess play.
