According to a telegram from Edward Lasker of Chicago, who, because of his standing as one of the country's foremost chess players, was asked to adjudicate the unfinished games from the Washipston's birthday telegraphic match.

F.) vs. Denio (C.). This game, printed in last Sunday's column, was considered beyond question as a win for San Francisco, Branch being two pawns ahead. In his telegram Lasker stated that they could find no win for San Francisco, but suggested that, inasmuch as it was the deciding game, it be left to an "outsider" for adjudication. However, Lasker's adjudication will be accepted by the local players, except for the game at board 7, Rogers versus B. Smith. In a return wire it was pointed out that the San Francisco player was about to win a pawn, with a strong attack. Lasker replied that he was under the impression that a draw had been agreed upon between the players at board 7 just before adjournment. Also, as Colonel Rogers was out of town, he was not certain of position and asked that it be forwarded, which was done.


