

BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETINGS

A CFNC Board of Directors meeting was held on 30 July 1967 at the McGinley residence with the following members present: George Koltanowski, Bill Stevens, Chuck McGinley, Virginia McGinley, Dick Phillips, Jerry Long, and Jim Hurt. Chuck McGinley presented a complete and detailed financial statement. A survey over the past 5 years shows that our CFNC membership has remained relatively constant at approximately 500 members, and although operating expenses have increased, that our treasury is still solvent. It was generally agreed, however, that CFNC should expand its activities in order to serve a larger number of players in the Northern California area and also to increase the quality of this service. To this end, the following two new directors were elected by unanimous vote of the board: Roy McCollough as East Bay Regional Director and Dave Betanco as Peninsula Regional Director. (Regional directors for San Francisco and other areas will be elected as soon as qualified candidates appear.) Duties of the regional director include (1) coordinating open tournaments, (2) sponsoring club tournaments, (3) promoting new CFNC memberships, (4) implementing wide use of the IRS rating systems, etc. Another area of expansion for CFNC lies in its magazine "Chess in Action." Although publication costs will be increased considerably, it was generally agreed to increase the number of pages to permit the addition of several new departments to the magazine. Another area of expansion for CFNC is the promotion of Junior events; for example, a Northern California Junior Chess Championship Tournament. The meeting was adjourned with the feeling that CFNC was moving forward.

A CFNC Board of Directors meeting was held on 9 August 1967 at LERA. The following members were present: Bill Stevens, Chuck McGinley, Dick Phillips, Jerry Long, Jim Hurt, Roy McCollough, and Dave Betanco. The agenda consisted of two items: (a) promotion of CFNC club tournaments, and (b) consideration of rule changes for the upcoming league season. It was generally agreed that CFNC would provide clubs with score sheets, pairing cards, and wall charts in return for which each club would utilize the IRS rating system and would require each player to be a CFNCmember. This will allow club events to be CFNC-rated, and avoid the confusion of separate rating systems. Challenge matches should also be CFNC-rated. Regional Directors Roy McCollough and Dave Betanco will contact clubs in their regions to provide this new CFNC service. It was pointed out that clubs should hold their tournaments in the very near future, as this will help them to establish their team entry in the upcoming League season. Proposed league rule changes included: (a) each player must be a CFNC member prior to playing his first league game, and (b) no league games would be rated until after the end of the league season (it is to confusing the other way). A team-captains meeting to approve rule changes will be held in mid-September. League play will start in late October.

The 1967/1968 CFNC Team Captains' Meeting will be held at the Berkeley Y.M.C.A. at 2001 Allston Way, Berkeley 4, California on Wednesday September 20, 1967 at 8:00 P.M. Any club interested in entering a chess team in the CFNC League play for the coming season should attend this important meeting. Team Captains are urged to review the 1966/1967 CFNC League Rules as any additions, deletions, or revisions will be decided upon at this meeting.

We have been told on good authority that a very reliable chess clock can be ordered from West Germany for \$9.00 (personal check is acceptable). This clock is identified as Type BHB No. 111 f Standard Wooden Case. The address is Fr. L. Rattmann, 2000 Hamburg 74, Postfach 365, Hamburg West Germany. An extra \$2.00 will bring the clock to you via air mail in about ten days, if you send your letter air mail (20 cents). You will probably have to pay an additional \$3.00 (approximately) unless your packaged clock is marked as a "Gift". We hear a certain player sent one to a friend, and his friend returned the compliment. Shipment via sea mail requires about 6 weeks, we hear. Don't forget zip code.

If you are interested in a good chess set at a low price (\$6.50 sounds like a low price), contact genial Dave Betanco (Peninsula Regional Director) at any of our CFNC tournaments. This set is often used in USCF tournaments and was used by Bobby Fischer when he played Tigran Petrosian last year, we are told. Dave can also supply you with large tournament-type ($2\frac{1}{4}$ inch square) paper boards at 35¢.

BERKELEY Y.M.C.A. CHESS CLUB CHAMPIONSHIP TOURNAMENT

The Berkeley Y.M.C.A. Chess Club will hold its Third Annual Chess Championship Tournament at the Berkeley Y.M.C.A. beginning on Wednesday October 4, 1967 at 8:00 P.M. This tournament is open to all CFNC players who are, or who will become, members of the Berkeley Y.M.C.A. Chess Club. Annual dues are \$5.00.

One of the ways of looking at the openings is from the point of view of the bishops. The knights are normally developed to the B3 squares. The queen and rooks are normally developed late in the openings, their development depending upon the course of events. But once the decision has been made as to how the bishops will be developed, and this decision must be made early, the pattern of the opening becomes set. For to develop the bishops, we must move two pawns, and the movement of these two pawns sets up a relatively permanent pawn structure. The bishops must be developed in one of four different methods, as follows: (a) advance the king pawn and queen pawn, (b) advance the king pawn and queen knight pawn, (c) advance the queen pawn and king knight pawn, and (d) advance the two knight pawns. Method (a) is the classical approach, and has always been popular among chess players. Method (b) is seldom played. Method (c) has become increasingly popular in recent years. Method (d) is relatively unpopular, but is used more often than method (b). It is possible that methods (b) and (d) will become more popular at some future time, when methods (a) and (c) will have been played to death.

One of the problems of method (a) is that if the ideal pawn formation of pawns on K4 and Q4 is not achieved, then one of the bishops becomes rather permanently locked in or locked out. For example, if the pawn structure is pawns on Q4 and K3, then the queen bishop will either be developed on the outside of K3 at KB4 or KN5 (and therefore unable to return to Q2) or developed on the inside of K3 at Q2 (and therefore unable to reach KB4, KN5, or KR6). Similarly, if the pawn structure is pawns on K4 and Q3, then the king bishop will be developed on the outside of Q3 or inside of Q3. These considerations play an important part in the strategy utilized by each player. For example, after 1 P-Q4 P-Q4, if Black plays B-KB4 and P-K3 in the opening, then White often plays for a queenside attack (often Q-N3 is a key move in this attack); or if Black plays P-K3 and leaves his QB at home, then White often plays for a king-side attack (often P-K4 is a key move in this attack). Similarly, after 1 P-K4 P-K4, if Black plays B-QB4 and P-Q3, White often plays for a king-side attack (he may try for B-KN5 and N-Q5, followed by an exchange that opens the position of the Black king); for example, the king-side attack is so strong in the Ruy Lopez that most players prefer to develop the bishop at K2 rather than at QB4. So we see that if the ideal pawn position is not achieved, then method (a) has inherent problems not present in methods (b), (c), and (d).

As method (c) vies in popularity with method (a), let us consider some of the aspects of this method. First, the most important difference between methods (a) and (c) lies in the castled position. Assuming king-sidecastling in both cases, in method (a) the king is protected by three pawns, a rook, and a knight; in method (c) the king is protected by three pawns, a rook, a knight, and a bishop. This extra bishop plus the pawn wedge (pawns on KB2, KN3, and KR2) makes the king much safer from attack than does method (a). If you have been using method (a) and your opponents have been breaking through your defenses and mating your king, switch to method (c) and your king will be much safer from attack. Practically speaking, this means that against 1 P-K4 you should play either the Pirc (1 P-K4 P-Q3; 2 P-Q4 N-KB3; 3 N-QB3 P-KN3; to be followed by B-N2 and 0-0) or the Dragon version of the Sicilian (1 P-K4 P-QB4; 2 N-KB3 P-Q3; 3 P-Q4 PXP; 4NXP N-KB3; 5 N-QB3 P-KN3; to be followed by B-N2 and 0-0); and against 1 P-Q4 vou should play either the Gruenfeld (1 P-Q4 N-KB3; 2 P-QB4 P-KN3; 3 N-QB3 P-Q4; to be followed by B-N2 and 0-0) or the Kings Indian (1 P-Q4 N-KB3; 2 P-QB4 P-KN3; 3 N-QB3 B-N2; 4 P-K4 P-Q3; to be followed by 0-0). If you have the White pieces, the openings utilizing method (c) include the Catalan, Reti, etc. It should go without saying that once you have decided on one of these openings, that you book up on that opening. For example, in the

main line of the kings Indian given above, White has no less than five moves to choose from for his fifth move. They are 5 N-B3 (classical), 5 P-B3 (Saemisch), 5 P-B4 (four pawn), 5 P-KN3 (fianchetto), and 5 B-N5 (Averbach). Transpositions are possible and sometimes desirable; White may play 5 B-K2 and then 6 N-B3, or he may delay 5 B-N5 to 6 B-N5. In any event, Black should know how to play against each of these five systems. Understanding the requirements of the position helps Black to find the right move. For example, in the standard Kings Indian, Black must contest the center with either P-K4 or P-QB4 and which of these he should choose depends upon White's fifth move. If White plays 5 N-KB3, 5 P-KN3, or 5 P-KB3 then Black should aim for P-K4; if White plays 5 P-B4 or 5 B-N5 then Black should aim for P-QB4 (P-QB4 can also be played against 5 P-KN3, but it is not as popular as P-K4). Remembering this relationship will help you to play the Kings Indian correctly.

As mentioned earlier, one way of looking at the openings is from the point of view of the bishops. Consider which method of developing the bishops is best for you, then choose the openings that utilize this method.

BOOK REVIEW

Chess Master vs Chess Amateur by Max Euwe and Walter Meiden

This book is written specifically for the "B" or "C" player. By presenting twenty-five carefully annotated chess master vs chess amateur games, it explains how the chess master beats the average "B" or "C" player. The inference is that once you clearly understand how the chess master does it, you too will be able to beat the average "B" or "C" player. In the illustrative games, the authors point out the typical bad moves made by these players, and then show you how to avoid these moves in your own games and how to take advantage of these moves in your opponents games.

One of the nice features about this book is that the reader need play through only one game in an evening and can then set the book aside for a time, as each game is complete in itself and does not depend on the other games. The more serious player might even memorize the games and the annotations. (The first game is only eight moves long, but covers seven pages. Masters know many games by heart.) By pacing yourself, and playing through one game every two weeks, the book can be completed in a year.

The book also contains a 22-page Introduction which (a) defines the various types of chess players, (b) defines certain chess terms, (c) explains the elements of chess as applied to master vs amateur games, and (d) explains the importance of learning chess from the study of master vs amateur games. Dr. Max Euwe, past world champion, is one of the better writers on chess. If you are a "B" or a "C" player and you wish to improve your game, this is the book for you. But remember, it is not how many books you own but how thoroughly you have mastered each book that counts. Better to own one book and know it thoroughly than to own twenty books with which you have only a casual acquaintance. And also remember, you can read a book on high school Algebra from cover to cover in just a few hours, but this does not mean that you have mastered Algebra; in general, it takes closer to one year of continuous study. It is similar with chess. Don't read this book through once hurriedly, and then think that you have mastered it. I know one "C" player who did this, yet I noticed that he is still playing 3 P-B5. This book is published by David McKay Company, Inc. and sells for \$5.95. The U.S. Chess Federation, as part of their chess promotion program, has been selling three for \$12.95.
