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

\*\*\*EDITORIAL\*\*\*

With this second anniversary issue of En Passant readers will notice the initiation of great changes in format and coverage. When this paper's first issue was published in September. 1904, the few small chess clubs which existed in the East Boy were struggling to maintain that existance. Since that time the membership and activities of these clubs have proliferated, and new chess clubs have even been organized in this area. However, the contact and relations between the clubs have not kept up with this expansion, but have remained at the same level at which they were two years ago. In view of these facts, in Passant set about to encourage the clubs to improve these relations, which are so important to the over-all advancement of chess in the area, The results of this undertaking fall roughly into two areas, but we hope that by means of this stimulus even more progress will be made by the clubs involved. I amount out

First, In Passant was asked to expand its coverage, so as to become the official newspaper of this new association of East Bay chess clubs: Berkeley MMCA, Concord, Hayward, Oakland, Richmond, and Walnut Creek. Members of each of these class clubs have kindly offered to supply this newspaper consistently with reports of the activities of their clubs. Besides Lonthly publication of this meterial, En Passant will contain many of the fine games played by the chess enthusiasts in the East Boy, cless problems, columns on chess theory, and feature articles of general interest to chess players.

Secondly, arrangements have been unde to change allexisting club rating systems to conform to the new USCF and CFNO system. This uniformity will allow for more accurate club ratings and mare reted play between the embers of the various last Boy clubs. Every month En Passant will publish current club ratings of all

The Oakland Chess Club drew 57 entrents to its Third Annual Summer Tournament, held on the weekend of July 23-24. Janis Salna, of Oakland, inched his way past 23 competitors in the Expert/A Division to Efinish was 45-5. Left one-half game behind were James Hurt, of Saratoga, who captured second place, and Bruce Foreman, of Richmond, the third-place winner. Kon Grivanis, of Oakland, led the field of 32-12 finishers, thus takingne fourth place.

The B Division brought two players to the top who scored 4-1. The tie was broken in favor of Richard Lee, of Oakland, who was then followed by Joseph Roberts, of Union City. David Betanco, of San Leandro, and Fred Sommer, of San Jose, finished third and fourth respectively, in the field of 22 contestants.

The C Division trophy was captured by Rodger Tucker, of San Francisco, who scored a perfect 5-0. Leonard Irottier, of El Cerrito, who won first place at the Second Annual Summer Tournament, again placed well, winning second place this time with a score of 4-1. Jesse Irwin, of Pleasant Hill, and Gary Bradley, of Concord, followed, respectively, in the division of twelve players.

With this tournament, directed by Theodore Anderson and Roy McCollough, assisted by Martin Morrison and Elwin Meyers, was iniated the practice of usind and instantaneous rating system, by which each player's CFNC rating was updated after each round and used as a basis for pairing the succeeding round. A "Return and Progress Trophy" was also instituted, being awarded at this tournament to Rodger Tucker, of San Trancisco, for the greatest gain in rating during the tournament by an entrant who had played in a previous Oakland Chess Club CFNC weekend tournament.

Through the efforts of the club's Publicity Directors, Martin Morrison and Elwin Meyers, day by day progress of the tournament was broadcasted on the KNEW (formerly KEWB) Radio news.

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In the past many problem authorities and composers have objected to castling in problems on the gournd that the right to castle can never be proved in any given initial problem position. Some have suggested as a compromise that Black, being the defensive player, should be allowed the privilege, but that it should be denied to White. The commonsense view oint is that inasmuch as castling takes place in almost every game that is played and because it is a move with peculiar positional consequences, composers should exploit its problematic possibilities.

In the last issue of En Passant a feature article appearred, entitled "The Rook...Or Is It the Castle." The authorship of this article was wrongly attributed to a Mr. Julius C. Alexander. Metellus writes: Huic ludo tabulae regis erat filius obvius/ Donec doctior hic, obtinuit promptius alean/ Rixan victus agit, corde patris forte potentior/ Et rocho jaculans, mortifere vulnus adegerat. (The king's son used to meet him at the gare of the chessboard, until the latter, since he was cleve er, prevailed in the game more quickly. The defeated player starts a ruarrel, since, as it hap ened, he is stronger in the affections of his father, and hurling a rook, he dealt him a nortal wound.

The Concord Chess Club has decided to use no club rating system. This is disappointing news, and we urge the club to reconsider, for the EBCA rating system can achieve its full potential only through the complete cooperation of all the East Day chess clubs.
