For those who are not a member of either chess organization: a year's CFMC membership is \$3.00, and a year's USCF membership is \$10.00 (\$5.00 for those

under 21 years of age).

The tournament will be a three-round, Round Robin in four-man sections. Players will be divided into sections on the basis of their rating class and their respective strength within their class, so that players of most nearly equal ratings will play each other. Unrated players will play among themselves. Players will be in a four-man section composed entirely of CFMC or USCF members. All games will be rated by the respective chess organization.

Each winner of a four-man section will receive a

fine trophy.

The first round will begin at 10:00 a.m. on Snday, Harch 17. Registration will be by mail to Oakland Chess Club (Clover Tournament), P. O. Box 1622, Oakland 94604. Players should enclose all fees, as well as their complete name, address, and telephone number. Registrations will also be accepted from 9:00-9:50 a.m., Sunday, March 17, at the tournament site, but advance entry by mail is greatly preferable. Fees will be returned to advance entrants by mail who are subsequently unable to attend.

CFMC Informational Questionaire By JEROLE LONG Tournament Director, CFMC

I submitted the following questionaire to the adults only at the New Year Open on January 6. The CFMC Board of Directors dismissed these results as inconsequential.

1. Do you think CFNC should have a constitution or a set of bylaws? YES 88%, no 12%.

2. Do you feel the CFMC Board of Directors should be elected by the CFMC membership? YES 80%, no 20%.

3. Should the Board of Directors allow CFMC members to spectate its meetings in open sessions?

YES 86%, no 14%.

4. Should the date and time of Board of Directors meetings be announced to the CFMC membership—giving sufficient advanced notice to allow membership spectation? YES 89%, no 7.8%.

5. Should the minutes of all Board of Directors meetings be published in Chess in Action? YES 77%,

no 18.8%.

6. Should there be at least an annual treasury report published in Chess in Action? YES 94%, no 4.2%.

7. Does CFNC offer adequate prizes in its tournaments? (That is to say, in tournaments other than those sponsored by clubs requiring CFNC membership.)

YES 42%, 110 42%.

8. Should CFNC help promote CFNC-affiliated chess clubs by publishing the results and announcements of inter- and intra-club activities in Chess in Action? YES 91%, no 7.8%.

9. Should Chess in Action publish a complete crosstable of results of all CFMC tournaments which

are held between issues? YES 77%, no 18.8%.

10. Do you think Chess in Action should be issued bimonthly instead of quarterly? YES 77%, no 18.8%.

11. If you answered yes to question #10, would you object to a one-dollar increase (from \$3 to \$4) of the annual CFNC membership dues—to cover the costs of a bimonthly publication of Chess in Action? Yes 22%, NO 66%.

Oakland Chess Club Starts Rental Library

Mr. Richard Lee, Treasurer of the Oakland Chess Club, has kindly offered the use of his own personal chess library to members of the Oakland Chess Club, as well as all members of the East Bay Chess Association (i.e., anyone who is a member of an East Bay chess club). The rental fee for borrowing books will be 25 cents per week (including a returnable deposit). For more information, Hr. Lee may be contacted as explained on page two of this issue.

EBCA ratings are computed by and supplied through each player's own chess club on the basis of games played between EBCA members and thus subsume club ratings. The ratings are computed on the United States Chess Federation and Chess Friends of Northern California standard, i.e., that sixteen points, plus or minus four per centum of the difference in rating points between the opponents, are at stake in each game.

If your rating does not seem correct or is not listed, see your club rater. The club raters are: Darrell Freeman, Alameda (A); Jerome Long, Berkeley YMCA (B); Jerome Long, Concord (C); Jerry Friedman, Hayward (H); Patrick Barry, Livermore (L); Duncan Campbell, Orinda (N); Raymond Ng, Oakland (O); Peter Brown, Jr., Richmond (R); and Saleh Mujahed, Walnut Creek Chess Club (W).

[We are sorry for any harm this error may have caused, but it was based on an honest misunderstanding, not to spark "several early renewals. Rather, we inadvertently misconstrued a portion of the minutes of the USCF Membership Meeting, August 15, 1967, published on page 318 of the October 1967 issue (XXII, x) issue of Chess Life, which reads as follows: "Mr. Rogarde, FIDE President, suggested an increase in FIDE dues and entry fees in order to strengthen it financially. Mr. Cramer urged that USCF support the Rogarde proposal." We unfortunately remembered "USCF" instead of "FIDE" when we published the issue.—EDS.]

****SINCLAIR LEWIS AND THE CHESSBOARD****
By D. E. KEELER

I received recently (in reply to an enquiry) a letter from San Francisco writer Barnaby Conrad. I give part of the letter here.

"I met Sinclair Lewis in Santa Barbara, where I was teaching school. He said, Do you play chess?" and I said no. 'I'll give you a month to learn, he

said, then come East as my secretary.

"This is what I did. Mr. Lewis was not a good chess player (nor am I), but he put great store by it and looked forward to his two games a day with great anticipation. I soon found that if he lost, he went into a foul mood... Other friends and visitors, such as Bennet Cerf and Carl Van Doren and John Gunther came [to play chess with Lewis]."

The following problem first appeared in the Wiener Schachzeitung [Vienna Chess Magazine], 1900, page 95. It was composed by Otto J. Blathy and dedicated to Gustav Reichhelm, of Philadelphia.

Since finding this mate in 292 moves, I have further investigated this subject and find that "the longest problem, without special conditions or restrictions, hitherto attempted, is a sui-mate in 423 moves by Mr. W. A. Shinkman....
