On April 1 (April Fool's Day), the results of the Oakland Chess Club's Crazy, Lucky Fool Tournament were announced. The contest lasted ten weeks, during which five rounds of play were completed. All a player's opponents and the colors for each round were drawn by lot. The King Fool (the winner, that is) was Richard Lee, who defeated all five of his opponents.

BARKELEY YMCA 1966 OPEN

On the weekend of Saturday and Sunday, June 25 and 26, the Berkeley YMCA Chess Club will hold its 1966 Open Chess Tournament. The tournament will be held under the auspices of the Chess Friends of Northern California and will consist of five rounds with three classes of play: Expert/A, B, and C. The entry fee for members of CFNC will be \$4 (\$7 for nonmembers, which includes membership); the fee will be increased wl if paid after June 9. Registration will take place from 10:00 a.m. to 12:00 m. at the tournament site, 2001 Allston Way, Berkeley, after which time the first round will begin. Trophies will be awarded to the first-place winners in each class; book, to the second- and third-place winners. Advance entry fees may be mailed to the club at the above address.

SEQUOIAS VICTORS

Two expert-classification players tied for top honors on April 15, 1966 in the second annual Visalia Amateur Open Chess Tournament, held at the College of the Sequoias student union. Fourty-one players from fifteen California cities and towns participated, playing five games each during a three-day period.

It is notable that two of our local players placed high on the list of winners. Roy McCollough of Oakland, and Whiter Dorne of San Francisco, tied with two others for first place in the A division (USCF).

Co-sponsoring the tourney for the second year in a row were the College of the Sequoias Chess Club, the Visalia Chess Club, and the recreation department of the city of Visalia.

In this game, White (C. W. Chattin) plays strong moves that develop all his pieces to good advantage. By move 16, Black (L. Schwartz) is threatening a strong attack on the queen side, but he has postponed castling, possible fearing a King-side attack. On move 17, White evaluated the position a decided that he can break open the center with two sacrifices and then successfully attack the black King. Therefore he plays 17 NxQP, PxN; k8 P-K6, ExP; 19 RxBch, KxR; 20 RxPch, K-Bl; 21 B-N6. These moves (17 NxQP and 19 RxBch) were correct, and qualify White for the "Best Played Game" award. Although a rook ahead, Black is in dire trouble. The game continues with 21...N-B4; 22 R-K5, N-Q2; 23 Q-K4ch, N-KB3 (forced). At this point, White misses his well-deserved win resulting from 24 R-K8ch!, RxR (forced); 25 QxQ, R-K2 (forced); 26 Q-Q8ch, N-K1; 27 QxN and the Queen advantage, exposed black King, and poor position of the Black pieces should yield White

an easy win. Instead, White plays 24 N-Q4, and after 24...Q-Q2, White wins a Rook with 25 B-B5, Q-Q3; 26 BxR. Black then forces a trade of Queens with 26. .. N-B5, and although one Pawn behind in the ending, Black trades pieces, centeralizes his King, and wins the ending (44 K-Q2 should have drawn).
