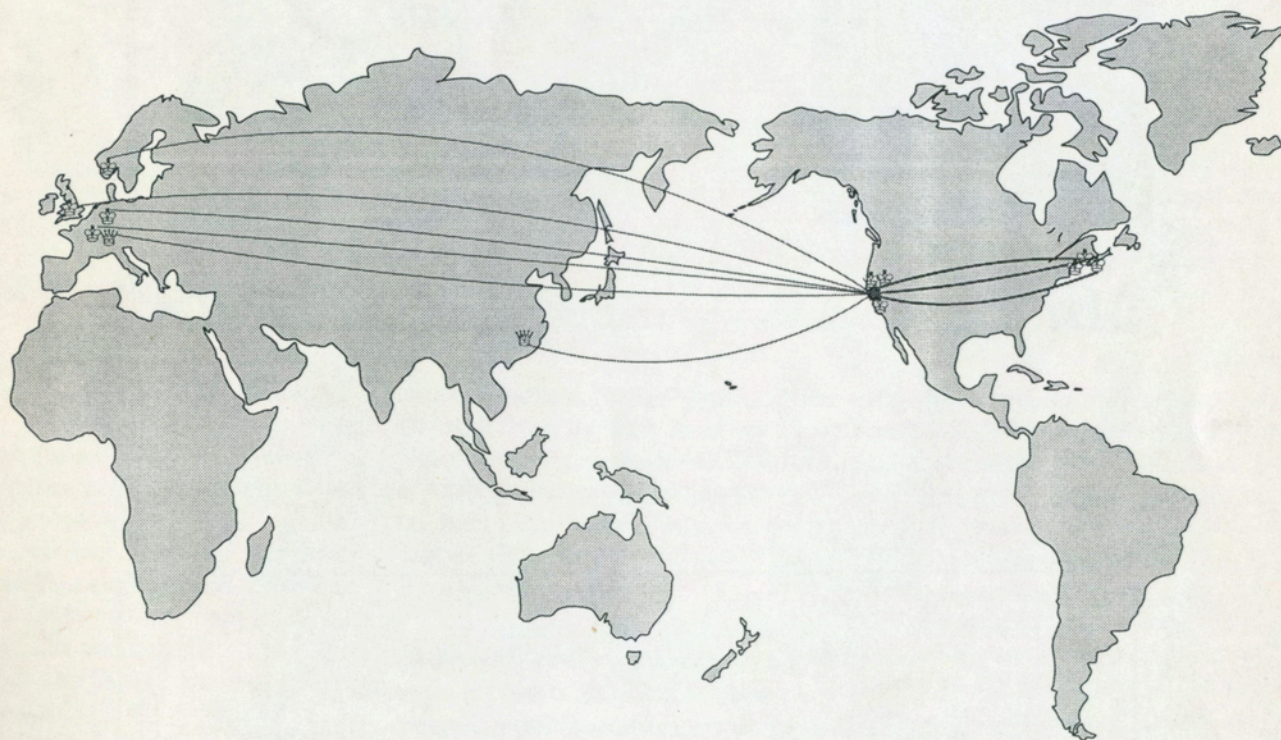

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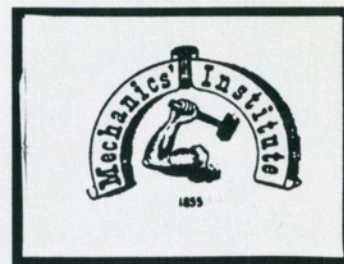

On behalf of the members of the 1995 Pan-Pacific organizing committee it is our privilege to welcome you to this event. It was just about a year ago this month that we undertook the task of organizing a grandmaster chess tournament in order to commemorate the 50th anniversary of the signing of the United Nations charter here in San Francisco in 1945. We wanted to do honor to the city, the institution and to the spirit of internationalism.

Historically, and certainly within the last fifty years, chess has been uniquely capable of transcending politics and borders. It cares not at all about differences in economic systems, or gross national product. It does care about human intelligence and achievement, and grandmaster chess is an expression of both. Nevertheless, we must extend the committee's heartfelt thanks to the Mindscape Corporation and to the Mechanics' Institute of San Francisco for their generosity in supplying the title sponsorship funding. The other tournament sponsors and individual donors are listed elsewhere in this program and we are indebted to every last one of them.

We are honored to have Grandmaster and International Arbiter George Koltanowski, of San Fran-

cisco, as our chief tournament director and to have Carolyn Withgitt as his assistant. As to the playing field, we are all pleased and proud to be associated with an event as strong and as diverse as this one. It should be obvious to all that one does not need to be sacrificed to the other. The International Masters must score 6-1/2 points out of the 11 rounds to earn their Grandmaster norms, and we wish them all good skill.

In conclusion, the members of the committee would like to express our appreciation to our chairperson, Neil E. Falconer, for his leadership and energy. Mr. Falconer has been quietly behind many of the best chess events in this area, not to mention San Francisco's Chess-in-the-Schools program, for many years. If you have a chance to shake his hand during this tournament, please do so, and tell him thanks—from all of us.

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The Players

Viktor Korchnoi

Viktor Korchnoi has been one of the leading players in the world since 1960. He unsuccessfully challenged Anatoly Karpov for the World Championship in 1981 in a bitterly contested battle in Merano, Italy, and lost a contest to PCA Champion Garry Kasparov in the World Championship Semi-finals in 1983. While he has been consistently ranked among the top players, 1994 was an especially good year for the veteran Grandmaster.

Korchnoi has overcome many obstacles on the route to stardom. He suffered greatly during World War II, when he was trapped in Leningrad during the siege. Later, he was persecuted by Soviet authorities and this led to his leaving his homeland to take up residency in Switzerland in 1976. Officially and unofficially boycotted by Soviet players and chess officials, he did not benefit from the generous assistance the Soviet government usually provided to chess grandmasters.

Fighting spirit and exceptional endgame technique characterize Korchnoi's play. In over 2,000 tournament encounters his margin of victory is very high, and he is known to scorn any early draw offers. Although not generally recognized as an opening theoretician, there is a variation of the English Opening named after him.

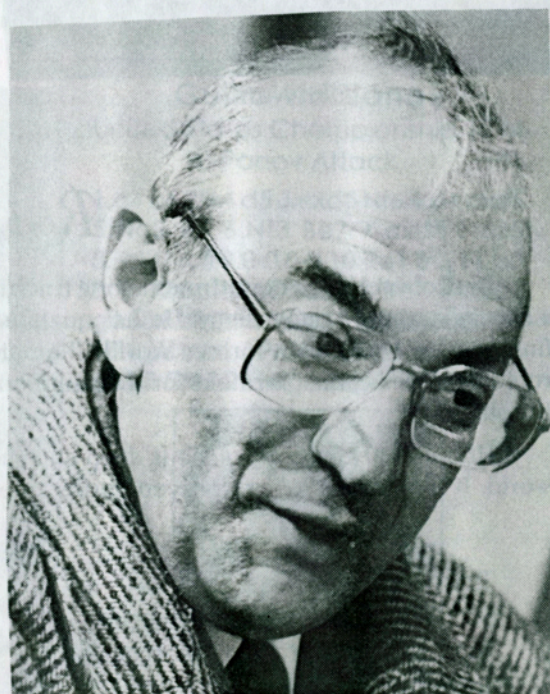

John Nunn

Dr. John Nunn is one of the most important players in the history of British chess. One of England's first crop of grandmasters, Nunn has won the British Championship on several occasions and has been a participant in many Olympiads, representing England, earning both prizes for performance in the event and also special problem-solving competitions. He is one of the best chess problem-solvers in the world, and has won the solving championship of Great Britain many times.

Nunn earned his doctorate in mathematics in 1978, and taught at Oxford for a few years before taking up professional chess full-time in 1981. He has published extensively on opening and endgame theory.



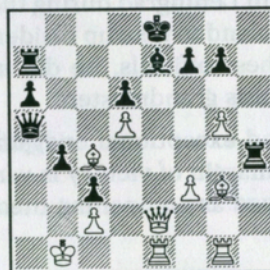

Robert Hübner

Dr. Robert Hübner continues a long tradition of chessplaying academics, holding a Ph.D. in Philology, with a specialization in papyrology. He has qualified for the Candidates' cycle several times, reaching the quarter-finals in 1971 (losing to former World Champion Petrosian), and was eliminated by a tie-breaking spin of the roulette wheel against former World Champion Smyslov in 1983. In 1981, he reached the finals, only to lose to Korchnoi.

Hübner is best known for his deep and thorough analysis of games, published in journals throughout the world. It is said that he works even harder after a game is finished than he does during the games themselves. He reads and speaks many languages, carrying on an intellectual tradition typical of chessplayers of the 19th and early 20th century.

As an opening theoretician, Hübner is famous for the popular variation of the Nimzoindian Defense which bears his name. His contributions to opening theory are numerous, and he acted as a second to Nigel Short in the 1993 World Championship match between Short and Kasparov.

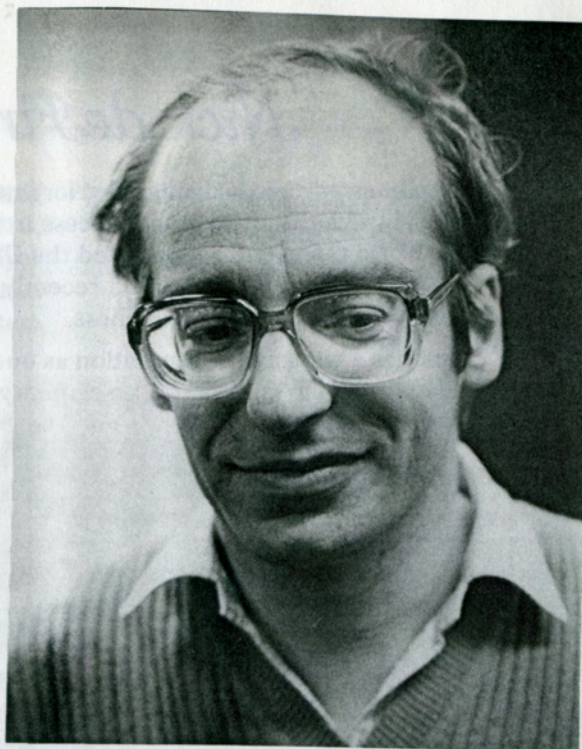

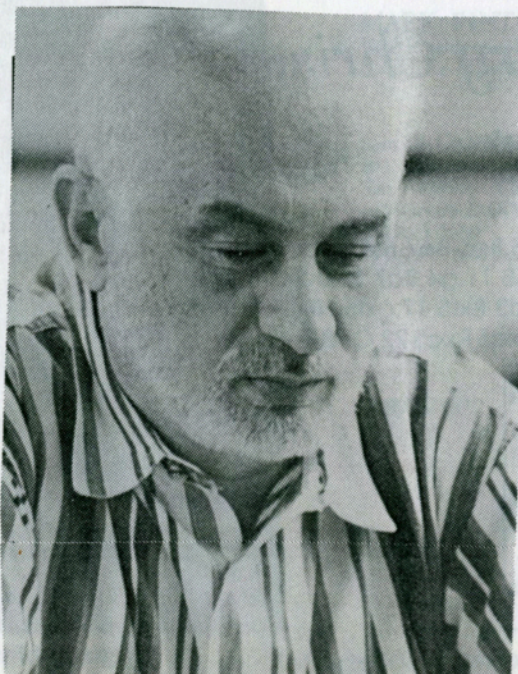

Boris Gulko

Grandmaster Boris Gulko won the 1994 United States Championship, and is the only player to win both the Soviet Championship (1977) and the American one.

In the mid-1970s he decided to leave the Soviet Union, but was denied permission by the authorities and was then persecuted to such an extent that his cause was taken up by international organizations. Denied opportunity to play chess in the Soviet Union or abroad, his game suffered greatly. Finally allowed to emigrate in the mid-1980s, he has finally returned to his old sporting form.

In 1994 he participated in the World Championship cycle held under the auspices of the Professional Chess Association. Not in the best of health, Gulko was eliminated by Nigel Short, who went on to become the official challenger. By winning the 1994 US Championship Gulko is now seeded into the 1995 FIDE World Championship cycle.



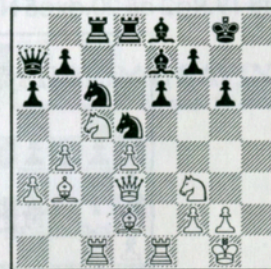

Nick deFirmian

Grandmaster Nick deFirmian tied for first place in the 1987 United States championship has enjoyed great success in the international arena, having won the World Open and represented the US in several Olympiads. A long-time resident of San Francisco, he recently moved to New York to pursue both business opportunities and chess.

Nick has a widespread reputation as one of the most dangerous players in the opening, where his knowledge of theory and innovative ideas frequently destroy the opponent's position before the game has progressed very far.

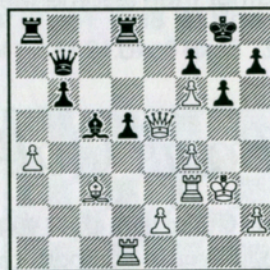

Grandmaster Larry Christiansen is a product of the chess boom of the Bobby Fischer era. He won the United States Junior Championship in 1973, and repeated that result the following two years. He tied for first at the 1983 US Open.

Christiansen is known for his uncompromising play and loves to get into tactical brawls. This style has gained him great respect in the chess world and has made Christiansen one of the most sought-after grandmasters on the International circuit.

Walter Browne

Grandmaster Walter Browne is best known for having won or tied for the United States Championship six times (1974, 1975, 1977, 1980, 1981, 1983). He is a major proponent of "blitz" chess, where each player has five minutes to complete all the moves in the game, and formed the World Blitz Chess Association, which has its own rating system and journal.

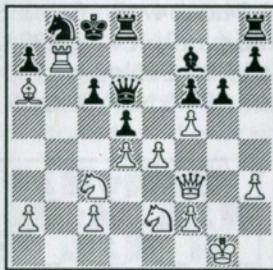
Browne is one of the few Grandmasters who excels in the grueling competitions on the American weekend circuit, having won the National Open and North American Open almost every time the events have been held.

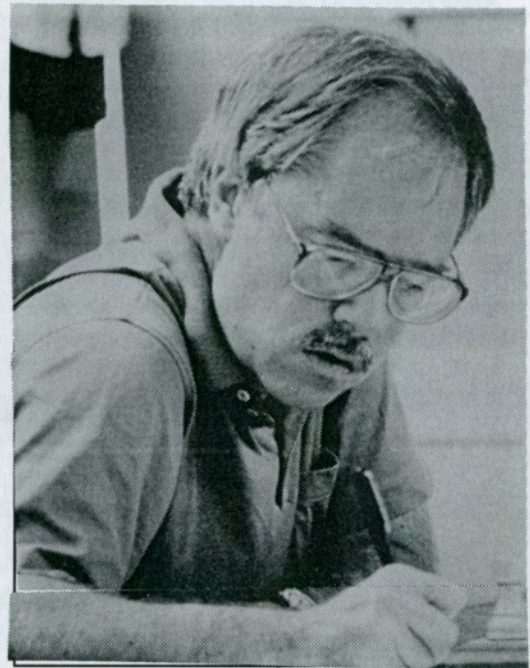

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Xie Jun

Grandmaster Xie Jun is one of the most accomplished women players in the history of the game. She learned xiangqi (Chinese chess) at the age of seven under the instruction of her father and became junior champion in Beijing at the age of 10. She then switched to the international form of chess and made rapid progress.

In 1990, she led the Chinese women's team to third place at the Olympiad. In the same year, she finished respectively first, shared second, and first in the Zonal, Interzonal and Candidates' Tournaments, through which, she became the first non-Soviet women player to challenge the then world champion, Maya Chiburdanidze.

In 1991, she defeated Maya by a score of 8.5-6.5.

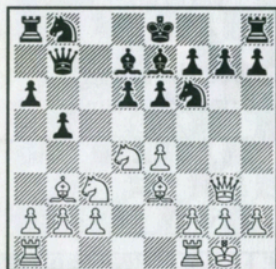
The middle sister of the famous Polgar trio is best known for her stunning performance at the Banco di Roma tournament in Rome 1989. There she reeled off eight straight wins before conceding a draw to a prominent Grandmaster in the last round, and this is considered to be the strongest performance by a woman player in the history of the game. In fact, only Fischer, Kasparov and Karpov have achieved such dominating performances against a professional field. Earlier this month, she tied for first place at the Bermuda Open.

The accompanying game was played when Zsofia was just 12 years old, and won the Brilliancy Prize.

Joshua Waitzkin

Josh Waitzkin's early life is literally an open book. His father, Fred Waitzkin, wrote *Searching for Bobby Fischer* based on the experience of teaching Josh chess. The book was later made into an acclaimed film. Waitzkin has continued to advance in the chess ranks, earning the title of International Master and in 1994, winning the United States Junior Championship, which brought the coveted prize of an invitation to the 1995 United States Championship where he will join the dozen top players in the country.

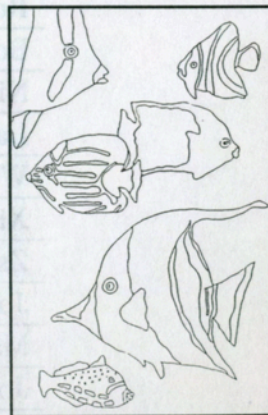
