En passant: Charles Crayne would probably have won the "C" trophy, but the "A" player who was playing the other contender offered a draw with a superior position because he wanted to play cards. George Kane kept consulting "Iggy's" magic fortune teller & apparently he received some inspiration from it. Arthur Wang found a novel way of losing an even position; forgetting he had made only 39 moves he also forgot to punch his clock. Hints on getting better results — "Don't direct and play in the same tourney." "Shake ashes on your opponents men, so when he tries to move he gets his fingers burnt!"
