Thank you for your letter of April 7th 1952.

I have contacted the Hotel Sainte Claire on this day and have made tenative arrangements to hold your exhibition on May 27th (a Tuesday) 1952 at 8.30 PM.

The Hotel Manager has agreed to place a nice large room at our disposal and I believe that the set up will be satisfactory in every way.

The Club will take care of your hotel accommodations at this same hotel and this should facilitate matters and give youan opportunity to rest up a bit and enjoy your stay in San Jose

As you requet, we will limit the boards to 25 in your simultaneous exhibition. We are charging a board fee of \$ 2.00 and as this is just a little bit more that we have been charging for our previous exhibitions, I'm not too sure at this moment whether or not we will hand pressed to take care of everyone who might desire to play. We have decided not to try and collect fees from spectators. I notice that some of the other clubs where you have appreared, did charge spectators but It is more or less difficult to do this. I dont like to charge spectators who just drop in for a few moments and it dont seem fair to charge However, if we should get more than some and not all. 25 requests to play, we might be able to screene out some of the strong players in favor of weaker players.

We are planning a sort of informal dinner at the hotel with you as our guest of honor around 6 PM. This will probably be limited to officers of the club and their wives.

I have not done anything furthur in regard to the Women's Club nor about an exhibition with school boys and girls. I was not just sure if I understood your viewpoints in this matter. get an acceptable place. I know I can get most any school cafeteria for an exhibition after 3 PM. I wonder if you would care to play an exhibition against students on the afternoon of your night exhibition. It would seem to me that this would be expecting too much from any one. Much would depend on how long you expected to stay in this Bay Region.
