 It's necessary to take risks to win a game, and Benjamin must win a game to advance to the inter-zonals, but this is far too unprincipled. Not even grandmasters should move their queens too early in 2. Black can't even carry out his threat: 6...Qc4 7. e4 Qe6 8. Nd5 Bd6 9. Bc4 etc.
3. Black does better trying to stall White's kingside development by 11...Qe4 12. f3 Qg6 13. e4 Rg8 14. Ne3 Bc5.
