The chess expert stopped his energy-burning stride: "I had to stop thinking-play was more mechanical. Then it became easier. The faster I played the faster they (his opponents) had to play. I started knocking them over because the faster they played the more mistakes they made and the sooner they conceded."

Though he acted like a tightlywound alarm clock that hadn't run down yet, the only sign of the chess master's ordeal was in his eyes which were slightly bloodshot.

"And the palms of my hands hurt," Koltanowski said. "I didn't realize it at the time but I was leaning on the tables, resting on my

"I won't want to shake hands for a long time," he said, smiling.

Koltanowski thought he could have gone on a lot longer. "I went to bed about 2 a. m. and got up at 7 o'clock," he said. "At the time I went to bed my back was a little tired from leaning over. That was all I felt physically.'

During the 12 hours of intense concetnration Koltanowski ate one sandwich, "And all the time I felt thirsty," he said "I guess I drank more than two pots of coffee."

Of the 271 games which Koltanowski played at The Chronicle Chess Festival in the Marines' Memorial Club, he won 251, lost 3 and drew 17.

The record will stand as official. Koltanowski also held the previous record of 226 games in a 12-hour
