The Monterey Cup

The 4th Monterey International Open Chess Tournament is all set to start at 11:30 a.m. Saturday, June 8 in the Pacific Room at the Hotel San Carlos.

Tournament Director will be George Koltanowski, International Chess Master, and one of the five International Referees in the United States.

Overall winner will receive \$175, the Monterey Cup, and the title of the 1968 Monterey International Open Chess Tournament Champion.

There will be other cash prizes, trophies, awards, prizes other than cash, and certificates.

The Tournament will be rated by the United States Chess Federation. Must be USCF member to play.

Entry fees for this event: Regular \$12.50, Junior, under 18, \$8.50 - if paid before June 5. After that the entry fee will be \$15.00 and \$11.00.

VOLUNTEERS NEEDED: Although many of the details and arrangements have been taken care of, we are still in need of some assistance to make the event run smoothly. Help will be needed at the Tournament Registration desk, assistants to the tournament director, demonstration board operators, equipment managers, and others to help with the odds and ends that will pop up to require smoothing. We will be able to use fathers and sons, mothers and daughters, players and non-players, in fact anyone that would like to help make this the most enjoyable chess tournament ever presented.

We will also need a substantial number of MPCClub members to sign up for the tournament to make it a real success. The top MPCClub member will receive a cash prize and a special trophy. This will be the lease expensive, big time tournament you will ever be able to enter. Register early and insure that this tournament will be a record setter.

Remember that the Monterey Peninsula Chess Club meets every Monday night at the Monterey Youth Center at Camino El Estero and Pearl. Make up your missed tournament games on Monday night. All of the equipment, cookies and coffee, competition for beginner or master.

Koltanowski, reporting on the 3rd Annual 1968 Peninsula (Bay Area) Open Chess Championship Tournament, held at Lockheed on Saturday and Sunday, April 27 - 28, says that 156 players signed in for the event. Could be the biggest weekend tournament held in any area. Kolti directed this tournament and passed out flyers on our Open.

Members of the Oakland Chess Club and other East Bay chess organizations have formed a new group called the "Central California Chess Association". Dissatisfied with the way "Chess Friends of Northern California" operated, the East Bay group broke away and established their own association in competition with CFNC. Our club has not found it necessary to belong to the Chess Friends group, although some of our members have joined them when, to qualify for bay area tournaments, it was required. Elwin Meyers, (Oakland CC), who was elected, along with Martin Morrison, as Editors (of the Scaccic Voice, CCCA's official publication) said that the competition would be beneficial to all local chess players. He feels that CCCA would be of more significance because of its affiliation with USCF.

Membership dues would be assessed on the basis of the club's membership at the rate of 20 cents bimonthly for each member. But it has not been made clear what benefits the MPCClub would derive from association with the CCCA, other than publicity of our chess events in the organization's paper. We are already affiliated with USCF, a National Chess Organization.

In addition to the above bimonthly dues, MPCClub would be assessed 25 cents per capita for our assessment on the basis of the number of players who participate in USCF-rated tournaments that show a profit.

Your Secretary has written to the Chairman of the CCCA for additional details and will pass the information on as it is received.

The first issue of "The Scaccic Voice", letters from the group's Secretary, Saleh Mujahed (Walnut Creek), and Martin Morrison, chairman pro tempore, are available at the Casa Alvarado Chess Center, for anyone wishing more information on this subject.

ARTICLE IV

Organization.

(1) The officers of the club shall be a President, Vice President, Secretary-treasurer, (combined by amendment) Tournament Director and Team Captain, to be elected for a term of one year by majority approval of the members present at the first regular meeting of the Club during the month of May.

Some time ago, Jerry Wollschlager demonstrated the moves necessary for white to stalemate black in 10 moves. The demonstration was remarkable in that the moves were forced and legal. Some captures were made in the sequence. In the following stalemate is forced in 12 moves (white) but without a single capture. 1. P-Q4,P-K4; 2. Q-Q2, P-K5; 3. P-QR4,P-QR4; 4. Q-B4,P-KB4; 5. P-R3,Q-R5; 6. Q-R2,B-N5ch; 7. N-Q2,P-Q3; 8. R-R3,B-K3; 9. R-KN3,B-N6; 10. P-QB4,P-B4; 11. P-B5, P-B5; 12. P-Q5,P-K6 Stalemate. (Personality of Chess)
