Zambia Set

The Republic of Zambia, formerly known as Northern Rhodesia, has issued four new stamps to honor the first anniversary of its independence. The 3 pence features the State House at Lusaka where the President resides. The 6 pence shows the Independence Stadium with fireworks in the air as it appeared on the morning of independence. The 1 shilling 3 pence depicts the orange flower of the tithonia, a wild plant found in cultivated areas throughout Zambia. The 2 shiling 6 pence has a species of the clematopsis flower found in the Zambia countryside. Each stamp bears a profile portrait of President Dr. Kuanda and the inscription "First Anniversary of In-dependence 24 October 1964."
