## CHESS TOURNAMENT

The First Annual Open Monterey Peninsula Chess Championship was a three-day event held Friday evening, all day Saturday, and Sunday afternoon & evening in the Monterey USO on July 5-6-7. It was a six-round tournament held to determine the best chessplayer in the Monterey Bay Area. It is possible that some stronger players did not compete but, as in any competitive sport, the laurels go to those who take the risk.

The winner, ALS instructor Lev A. Beliavsky, was undefeated, conceding only a draw to Alexander Parvu Jr in the final round. He is now, by virtue of this tournament (which was open to all), the official area chess champion with the highest priority to meet any visiting chessmaster in match play, such as Rossolimo on the radio two months ago (Station KIDD, May 2nd).

Round 1, Friday, July 5th: Eleven players won their first round game, giving them all an equal chance for firth place. Mathematically, however, some loser could still pull himself together with a series of wins.

Round 2, Saturday morning, July 6th; The field of winners narrows to five. Chess Expert Beliavsky wins his game from Seaside player Edwin A. Bumm; Salinas City Champion Rex V. Wilcox defeats Monterey player Thomas C. Young; Parvu edges past Russell Q. Maeth from Santa Cruz; Fort Ord Major Don J. Stewardson topples Bon K. Bissonnette from West Simsbury, Connecticut; and ALS Instructor Alex Pavlovich upsets former Cornell College Champion John H. Gidley from New Jersey.

Round 3, Saturday afternoons Only three remain undefeated. Beliavsky continues with a fine victory from former Salinas Oity Champion George B. Oakes. Parvu gets into a winning position, makes the strategical error of opening up the game and loses — to Wilcox! It was trap and counter-trap all the way, but finally former Fort Benning, Georgia Champion Robert A. Karch succumbs to Stewardson in a memorable encounter. After this round, we receive word that the Major's son, Jim Stewardson, has just won the Junior Championship!

Round 4, Saturday evening: While Beliavsky eliminates Wilcox, Stewardson earns a point from Pavlovich, leaving two players tied for first place with a perfect 4-0 score. And, so the longest round came to an end! Three rounds of fighting tournament chess in one day (9 AM - 11 PM) left us all just about exhausted.

Semi-Final Round 5, Sunday afternoon, July 7: The leaders are paired and, three hours later, Beliavsky stands alone. Attention now shifts to the runners-up, since engraved trophy cups are being awarded for 2nd thru 5th places. In this category fall five with mathematical chances; Wilcox (4-1), Parvu (4-1), Stewardson (4-1), Oakes (32-12), and Gidley (32-12).

Final Round 6, Sunday ifth evening, July 7: Beliavsky draws Pervu, Oakes and Gidley win; and Wilcox and Stewardson draw each other to create a five-way tie (42-12) for second place! This rarely happens in chess tournaments, altho is is theoretically possible. The tie-breaking system measured the strength of the opponents met (determined by the final scores of each), which ruled Gidley 6th, just one place short of a trophy. However, after the tournament, the Tournament Commuttee (Karch, Parvu, Stewardson and Young) decided to purchase an additional trophy for Gidley which is now on order.

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
