He bade farewell to Los Angeles after the tournament with a blindfold simultaneous exhibition at the Athletic Club, when against consulting teams at 8 boards he scored 5 wins and 3 draws.

The winner of the minor tournament at Pasadena, the Rev. Howard Ohman, of Omaha, is Nebraska State champion. J. L. Sheets, who was a good second, is Seattle champion. We see that the team match between Mexico and California, 4 a-side, is described as a friendly, the projected team tournament having fallen through

The New York State meeting, at Rome this year, suffered from starting on the same day as the Pasadena Congress; and consequently Fred Reinfeld, the holder of the State title, was not present to defend it. Nathan Grossman, of the New York City College, was a fairly easy victor, with a score of 5 wins and 2 draws.

Brazil.—In the absence of the holder, O. Trompowsky, the championship of the Brazilian Chess Association has been won by Adolf Berger, who in a double-round tournament of 6 players scored 71 points. He lost both games to M. N. Fonseca, who was second with 61, but otherwise only dropped half a point, whereas Fonseca lost 3 games and drew one.

Chile.—This year's championship has been won by Enrique Reed, a 16-year-old player from Valparaiso.

In L'Italia Schacchistica for September 15 there is a vigorous editorial protest, alleging that the recent book by M. Duchamp and V. Halberstadt, L'Opposition et les Cases conjuguées, is a plagiarism from a work entitled Contributo alla teoria dei finali di soli pedoni, by Ing. Dott. Rinaldo Bianchetti, published through our contemporary at Florence in 1925.

It is expected that Dr. Emanuel Lasker will be in London again in January. Our last news of him was that he was still living in Holland.
