Northern California Open Championship; October 19 - November 16

JAMES N. SCHMITT WINS -- ADDISON, BAGBY FOLLOW

West Coast Senior Master James N. Schmitt of San Francisco scored decisively (8-1) to win the Northern California Qualifying Tournament. Jim, who won last year's state open ahead of International Master Larry Evans, is rather infrequently seen in California competition. In fact, he seems to conserve his strength for the tough ones!

Since the round-by-round pairings were not available at the time the Mechanics Institute Chess Club (site of most of the games in San Francisco) was visited, the cross-table below had to be computed directly from the tournament pairing

cards. E. C. Jonas and the editor worked out the results together.

When we finished, we found that Bill Addison and Charles Bagby had switched positions! An earlier quick count on the tie-breaking points had placed Bagby second. However, the standings given here are based on adjusted scores prior to the Sonnen-berger count. All forfeit wins are then discounted. For example, Frankenstein's first round win over Cuneo netted him two S-B points (actual wins) instead of three.

Schmitt, Addison, and Bagby are all now qualified to play in the state championship finals to be held soon in San Francisco.

Arizona State Open Championship

PETER LEUTHOLD WINS -- JAMES, THURSTON, HUBIAK AND CHRISTMAN TIE AT 5-2

The newly organized Phoenix Chess Club took a deep plunge and came up with -sponsorship of the fourth Arizona State Open Championship! It was held in the
Colonial Room of the Chessward Ho Hotel, Phoenix, Arizona on August 30, 31st, and
September 1st.

A wide geographical distribution of prizes was made to the top five players. Peter Leuthold  $(5\frac{1}{2}-1\frac{1}{2})$  took the Champion's Trophy (plus ten dollars) home to Yuma, Arizona; Norman James (5-2) took his trophy to Phoenix, Arizona; Ben Thurston (5-2) to Alberquerque, New Mexico; and David D. Hubiak (5-2) to White Sands, New Mexico. Possibly the trophies ran out when James Christman (also 5-2) received five dollars cash, althouthe tie-breaking system was not explained in the report mailed to us.

The Women's Trophy was earned by Mabel Burlingame  $(4\frac{1}{2}-2\frac{1}{2})$ , one of the top

fifteen rated women chessplayers in the United States.

Cross-table results given below are not in round-by-round order, but they clearly indicate how the players performed against their opponents. All players will appear on the forthcoming January list of West Coast Ratings.

George Koltanowski, international master, well-known chess promoter....and a dozen other things!....writes a daily chess column in the San Francisco CHRON-ICLE. On Mondays thru Fridays, George usually runs some introductory comment, a recent master game with his annotations, and a problem. He also plays correspondence games "by newspaper" with some 500 players in the San Francisco Bay Area.

On Sunday, however, Mr. Koltanowski publishes a special two or three-move problem and awards prizes to the leading solvers every few months. New solvers are always welcome and anyone can enter the ladder-competition at any time.

By actual count, 212 persons were on the most recent list of solvers!

Prizes were awarded to Fred Best (third time winner) from San Jose and Raymond
J. Schweizer (second time winner) from San Francisco.

OLAF ULVESTAD WINS -- CLARK HARMON RUMMER-UD

Up the west coast in Yakima, Washington tournament organizer Oliver W. Ia
Freniere has returned to chess after four years of inactivity. His "Central Washington Open" was the successful inauguration of a new annual event, attracting players from two states. (Actually, exploitation of the winter season for chess competition has proceeded very slowly throughout the country and anyone who has tried it usually reports a good turn-out. -Ed)

Olaf Ulvestad  $(5\frac{1}{2}-\frac{1}{2})$ , a well-known master from Seattle, merely added another notch to his reputation. Clark Harmon (5-1) from Portland scored a real upset over West Coast Master Ivars Dalbergs  $(4\frac{1}{2}-1\frac{1}{2})$  who, until this once, had been ab-

solutely undefeated in four successive tournaments!

What would an expert have played for the second good move, instead of 13. B-R5???

For that matter, what third move would the master have found? Or can any of us answer that question? At least, it's fun to try!
