M. I. KNIGHTS EDGE GOLDEN GATE 4-3 TO WIN TEAM CHAMPIONSHIP IN A DIVISION

GOLDEN GATE CAPTURES B DIVISION TEAM CHAMPIONSHIP WITH WIN OVER MECH INST B

SAN FRANCISCO, March 14. The Knights of Mechanics' Institute edged Golden Gate 4-3 to again retain their A Division crown of the S. F. Bay Area League. An adjourned game between G. Ramirez (G.G.) and J. Murray (M.I.K.) finally decided it all after lengthy battles on March 7. Golden Gate once again had to settle for the second spot, a frustration they have endured for the past three years. The Castle team landed in third place with a last round victory over the M. I. Bishops 5-2.

Match scores were Knights 5-0, Golden Gate 4-1, Castle 2½-2½.

Individual honors will be a tough vote as J. Murray and E. Pruner ended up with perfect scores of 5-0, with a vote for G. McClain with a perfect score of 4-0, including a win over California State Champ Charles Bagby.

In the B Division Golden Gate just about walked over everybody with a final round win over Mechanics' Institute B 5-2, the team that finished second. The Mech. Inst. B/1 team defeated last year's champs, Precita Valley, 5-2 to finish third, the latter apparently being disheartened as the season progressed. The match scores were Golden Gate 4-0, Mech. Inst. B 3-1, and Mech. Inst. B/1 1½-2½.

There was a mess of perfect scores among the individual performances, but those playing all four matches and ending up with 4-0 records were Henry King and George Farly of Golden Gate and Leighton Allen of Precita Valley.

S. F. Open Championship

TWELVE ROUND SWISS TO BEGIN MARCH 28TH AT MECHANICS' INSTITUTE 7 P.M. FOR CITY CHESS CHAMPIONSHIP - 50 EXPECTED TO PLAY

A 12 round Swiss System tournament is to begin at Mechanics' Institute, 57 Post St., at 7 P.M., March 28, 1959 for the San Francisco City Open Championship. It is open to all chess players who reside within 50 miles of San Francisco and who now are or become members of the Chess Friends of Northern California or the California State Chess Federation. For members of the above the entry fee is \$5.00. Membership to CFNC is \$2.60 per year and to CSCF is \$2.50 per year. The membership fees include subscriptions to the organizational publications: CHESS

IN ACTION (CFNC) or CALIFORNIA CHESS REPORTER (CSCF).

Entries may be given to Guthrie McClain, 244 Kearny St., 4th floor, S.F. 8, Pacific Coast CHESS HERALD, 117 Brewster St., S.F. 10, Arthur Stamer,

c/o Mechanics' Institute Chess Room, 57 Post St., S.F. 4, Russell Freeman, 6327 Outlook Ave., Oakland 5, or Henry Gross, 68 Post St., S.F. 4.

There will be a first prize of \$50.00 and a trophy, 2nd prize of \$30.00, and a 3rd prize of \$20.00. In addition there will be trophies for the highest finishing "A", "B", and "C" players and a trophy for the player making the best score in the last six rounds. Only one prize to a player though.

Time limit is 40 moves in the first 2 hrs., and 20 moves per hr. thereafter. Rounds will be once a week for 12 weeks. Harkness pairing system will be used. West Coast Ratings published Jan. 1959 (CHESS HERALD) will be basis for 1st rd. Henry Gross will be tournament director.

Brief History of Chess Herald
OLD SUBSCRIBERS MAY SKIP this portion of
our periodical as it is old stuff. Your
editor merely wishes to give a brief
history of the paper for those new sub-
scribers we have gained during the past
year. They might be interested in the
background of a little periodical they
so faithfully subscribed to.

CHESS HERALD, then, began simultane-
ously with the Precita Valley Chess
Club on March 15, 1956. The club was
organized in the interest of the Mission
District chess players of S.F. Being
the organizer, I felt a club would be
more livelier with it's own publication.
So, out came the Precita Valley CHESS
HERALD, "A Weekly Chess News Bulletin".
That's right---, it was first a little
one and two-pager weekly and carried
nothing but news of the club itself. It
was published in this manner for 22 con-
secutive weeks. During this time I was
getting requests for copies of CHESS
HERALD from chess fans who remembered me
as editor of CHESS IN ACTION, organ of
Chess Friends of Northern California, &
THURSDAY KNIGHTS, a club paper I started
for another club in the city. My mail-
ing list grew and so did the paper as I
felt obliged to print news to satisfy
these outside readers. It got so I was
not able to publish it weekly, and so in
September 1956 the paper became P.V.
CHESS HERALD, "A Monthly Chess News
Bulletin".

Along about March 1957 I became very
surprised at the popularity of CHESS
HERALD and I had quite a demand for
copies, more than my pocketbook could
handle, so I began asking for subscrip-
tions to help me bear the load. The
response was slow at first, but slowly
and surely CHESS HERALD's circulation
was and is growing. Lou Tomori of San
Bruno, by the way, was the very first
paid subscriber of this paper, paying me
a dollar before I actually started
charging this price for a year's sub-
scription, and he was the person to sug-
gest I charge for it and that it was
well worth the dollar.

(EDITOR'S NOTE: Mr. Frank Pratt is our newest columnist and I hope you enjoy his articles. I'm sure Frank will appreciate any personal comments, so---, he lives at 517 Prospect Ave., Hot Springs, Arkansas.)

GEORGE FLYNN'S REMARKS about taking chess too seriously rang a bell for me. I took up postal chess as a hobby when I was no longer able to engage in more active sports. After keeping 30 to 40 games going all the time for nearly ten years, I reached the point where answering my cards was frequently just another unpleasant chore. So I decided to stop worrying about my rating and start playing for the fun of it.

As I do not have the slightest interest in the kind of slow positional maneuvering designed to keep the position closed, and a draw in hand, I now try to play in the style of 70 to 100 years ago. Develop fast; bust the position wide open (if I lose a pawn or two, who cares?); then look for combinations. Now, I am enjoying my games, sharpening up my tactics, and expect that I will soon be a much stronger player.

One of my postal opponents told me that if I keep on, I will be a very strong player when I grow up. As I am now 65, I don't know just when that will be. But regardless of age, I would rather be able to play the ever-youthful games of Marshall or Blackburne, than the old-man's- chess of Reshevsky or Fischer.

I recently sent a pamphlet showing some of my best games to my chess playing friends. One New Yorker wrote: "These games are fun! and some are very good." I did not expect the New Yorkers to enjoy them but thought many others would. Here are some recent postal games of the same kind. Provide your own notes.

It was in the BRITISH CHESS MAGAZINE--in a feature called, "Chess One Hundred Years Ago." Tell you what, next time I'll dig through the files and see if I can get his name.

Meanwhile, I keep thinking of mayonnaise--could it be Labourdannais? Or just how do we spell that name? Anyway, I came up with a pome:

I think of mayonnaise
And feel tres, tres malaise
When I play ze great Labourdannais.

Everything seems sticky
And I feel tres icky
When I play ze Gligoric-y.

Now I'm waiting to see if Lowell Tullis (that MADman) can come up with a rhyme for Koltanowski. Meanwhile I must say one thing about Koltanowski--he's one man who can beat you with his eyes shut.

By the way, I had a nice insane letter from Lowell Tullis, welcoming me to CHESS HERALD as a fellow columnist. I shore did enjoy hearing from you, Lowell--but you haint no chess columnist, and I'm gonna tell you why.

C.J.S. Purdy, many times champion of Australia, once remarked that when a chess player wrote a column, any fair opponent should give the chess writer Rook odds. That's why you haint no columnist, Lowell. I hereby accuse you of winning three games in a row in the Precita Valley tournament--that alone is enough to kick you out of the chess columnist's union. Have you any reasonable explanat'n?

Have you ever played Tandem Chess? It's sort of chess played on a bicycle built for two. There are four players--two on each side. The two partners play alternate moves--seems like it would be a novel type of tournament--possibly you could match a strong player with a weak player to create each team. The whole thing would be just for fun, and you could always blame your partner for losing.

My old friend, Jim Marianos, of the Sacramento Club and I were once playing together against two opponents in a game of Tandem Chess. One of our opponents had to leave, so the remaining player gallantly carried on alone. After the two of us had defeated the one of him, Jim remarked: "It just goes to prove that two heads are better than one."

Maybe Lowell Tullis could check up on that two-headed business with his friend who writes from another planet--the one who says the game of chess is so different out there.

CHESSALUNATIONS

of LOWELL TULLIS

A Syndicated Mess

THE CHESS ENTHUSIAST IS undoubtedly the most maligned man on the American scene. As folklore would have it, he is the fellow who moves his family into a tent to create an adequate meeting place for his club. He is also the man who readily admits, "I play horribly but look at my win-loss ratio". Word is out that chess addicts really don't like to play, but would rather solve problems, kibitz or write about the Royal Game!

The legend started just as soon as chess itself really got going in this country-- in the years right after World War II. In those days, of course, the true addict was thought of as a long grey beard, basically unfamiliar with the outside world, who left the old folks home only to play in tournaments. Shortly thereafter came the neighborhood odd ball who spent as much as \$20 for a chess clock! Imagine wasting two weeks grocery money--, or the price of a new suit on a game. Only recently has there been any recognition for this beknighted figure, this living joke also has precipitated one of the most startling revolutions in our time. And if anyone is responsible for this astounding development, it is the poor old cheap chess fanatic with his perpetual thirst for more and more game scores to fall back on. It is the "bug" who always asks for something more; and, of course, some of the fanatic's alleged interest in pure chess has paid off in such interesting flights into space such as Fischer's fantasy--, class B to grandmaster in 12 months!

Playing exquisite chess makes the player a kind of artist, although many a fanatic would quake at this apparition as many of them, indeed, are bad artists. But the true fanatic is not content to merely sit and play. He must have every chess book in print, even the corny ones, for until they are devoured he knows not but that one book may contain an obscure line everyone else has forgotten. So, let us agree now, that somewhere there is that true fanatic who is mortgaged to the point where he can truly sing, "Lord, don't call for me as I can't rest, for I owe my soul to the game of chess". The sorrow of it being that, although he is elected club president year after year, the members openly admit they vote for him only because no one else will run! He has floundered for years without a name, but now, out of the West, comes this all encompassing title--; he is a CHESSALUNATIC.

But a woodpusher I'll forever be for I cannot understand why one should study to find the easy, short way to win when you have an overwhelming position---, why not end the game like a butcher? International master Bill Lombardy speaking of combinations (CHESS LIFE 12-5-58) states, "Most combos are entirely unsound". So why should I search for that mate in three with P-N5 when R-B6 forces the exchange RxR, PxR followed by P-B8(Q), or gives me 3 connected passed pawns with RxP. Only a "miracle" diehard could continue. This, of course, is disregarding the remote possibility that your flag will fall while you are searching for that non-existent problematic finish.

O.K., George, words at 90 miles sounds O.K. to me.....
