Each player won 7 games and

10 were drawn.

Under the rules of the Inter-national Chess Federation (FIDE) the champion retains his title in the event of a drawn match. So Botvinnik continues to wear the crown he won in 1948.

The champion seems chronunable to win a match ically against a top-flight player. In 1933 he played to a 6-6 tie with Flohr, and in 1937 a 61/2-61/2 tie with Levenfish.

1951 Encounter

In the world championship encounter of 1951 against Bronstein, Botvinnik again drew with a score of 12-12, as in the match just concluded.

Botvinnik did win a match Ragozin in 1940, but against Ragozin is not quite in the top

It begins to look like Botvinnik's strength is more in tournament play than in match play.

Botvinnik's crown is now secure for three more years, if he so chooses. Samuel Reshevof the United States will issue an official challenge soon, but the champion need not accept it, under FIDE rules.


