

Answer to Task No. 23: B-Q5

Answer to Task No. 25 should be post-marked not later than August 7. It is required only that White's first move be given. The sixth list of solvers' names will appear next week.

FROM the Nebraska Chess Bulletin we quote the following: "Omaha has been selected as the site for the Eighth Annual United States Junior Championship, from August 18 to August 23 at the Hotel Rome. There is no entry fee. Accommodations will be furnished by the hotel at \$1.50 per day exclusive of meals. Entries should be filed with Alfred Ludwig, 317 Y. M. C. A. Building.

"The history of the junior championship is colorful indeed. The event is limited to boys under 21. Larry Friedman of Cleveland was the first two-time winner, 1946-47. Arthur Bisguier won the crown twice, in 1948-49. Jim Cross of Glendale, California, won the title in 1950, while Saul Wachs of Philadelphia is the defending ruler."
