

White Mates in Three Moves (Value 7 points)

Answer to Task No. 20: R(B5)-Kt5.

Answer to Task No. 22 should be post-marked not later than July 17. Two distinct variations leading to mate should be given.

THE challenge match for the championship of the United States, between present champion Larry Evans of New York and former champion Herman Steiner of Los Angeles, is now in progress. The player who first scores 8½ points will be the winner. Evans won the first game, and Steiner the second. The third, fourth and fifth games were won by Evans, in each case after Steiner had declined the offer of a draw! There is an old saying in chess that a sure way to lose is to try to win a drawn game! The sixth and seventh games were agreed draws. Evans therefore was leading by a score of 5-2.

The first ten games were to be played in Los Angeles, and the next two in San Francisco.

The ten-game match between Sammy Reshevsky of New York, and Svetozar Gligoric of Yugoslavia, was won by Reshevsky after a hard struggle by a score of 51/2-41/2. The tenth game, which will be given next week, was a beautiful and bitter fight, ending in a draw after 76 moves.
