Chess

VANCOUVER, B.C., Sept. 4 (TASS). World chess champion Boris Spassky won first prize (\$800) in the 1971 Canadian Open. The Soviet grandmaster scored 9 out of a possible 11 points without losing a game (7 wins and 4 draws).

Equal with Spassky at 9 points was Dutch master Hans Ree, but a tie-breaking system determined that Ree had played the weaker opposition, so he was awarded second place (also \$800).

Third and fourth places (\$250 each) were shared by the winner of the 1971 U.S. Open, young grandmaster Walter Browne of Australia and Canadian champion Duncan Suttles. Both finished with 8½ points.
