There was one bright spot in the picture -- R. E. Russell won the top board over one of the finest players in California, Bert Mueller. Mueller went undefeated last year in our league but he finally proved he was human, too. The amusing part of this was that I had very serious doubts about our strategy in playing Russell on Board 1, although, having won the Sacramento Championship, he was clearly entitled to the spot. I figured Russell needed one more year of seasoning before taking on such a chore, but Roy proved me wrong, and I was very happy to be wrong.

Our Auburn players are the only ones who seem to win against San Jose--last year, Jim Hardy and this year, Roy Russell. We'll have to be sure Ed Horton, another Auburn player, is in there pitching next year. By the way, Ed, it probably would have surprised you to hear the nice things Bob Burger had to say about your games. He played you one evening at the club and afterwards sent me a couple of

diagrams of interesting positions you had reached that night.

Oh yes, and we have to chalk up \$\frac{1}{2}\$ point against Neil Austin, on Board 6. Ray Richards, a very strong player, had a draw by repetition of moves versus Janis Kalnins of San Jose (Kalnins is no slouch at the game himself, as events proved.) Anyway, Neil as team captain told Richards to take chances and try for the win. Ray, like a good soldier, obeyed orders and lost. But Neil takes full responsibility for that \$\frac{1}{2}\$ a point, and, since he himself scored \$\frac{1}{2}\$ a point—that mathematics, according to Solid Geometry, brings him down to a score of 0. Boy, wait till Neil sees me next time.

Before the match, the Sacramento gang had a nice chat with those Fresno Warriors—Leo Legler, Kyle Forrest, Phil Smith, Tom Freez and Nike Hailpern. They had a lot of kind comments on our Sacramento Chess News, which we all appreciated. But they had one wrong idea—they figured I had more to do with it than I did.

J. B. Gee is Editor, Publisher, and the one man without whom we wouldn't even have our little paper. WINTER TOURNALEDT FLAY

An Open Swiss System Tournament of five rounds to be known as the 1951 Qualifying Tourney will be commenced October 24 at 8 pm. The rounds will be started on alternate Wednesdays -- Oct. 24, Nov. 7, 21, Dec. 5 and 19. Any tie for first place (in both actual and S.B. points) will be played off between Dec. 19 and Jan. 16, 1952.

Entrance fee is \$1.00. One prize will be given, a trophy of nominal value (\$5.00). The remaining money collected will be divided into two equal parts and applied toward prizes for two Round Robin tournaments which will follow the Qualify-

ing Tourney and begin simultaneously on Jan. 16.

The first of these events will be contested by the top half, plus the possible odd place, of the order of finish in the Qualifying Tourney and will determine the Sacramento City Champion for 1952. The second will be played amongst the lower half in order of finish of the Qualifying Tourney and will be titled the Team Reserves Tournament.

Entrance fee will be \$1 for these latter tourneys, which sun, with the residue from the Open event will be applied toward prizes of trophies and books for the

first four places in each event.

Winter and the chess season is upon us again so let's not miss getting in on the tournaments. These events will be rated on both a northern state and national scale so here is a good chance to begin or add to your record. And with nine prizes to be contested for in the three events every entrant has a reyal chance to bag

something.

Especially necessary is participation by all because of our present temporary dislocation of meeting place. Lets not fall apart as a group simply because we do not just presently have an ideal, permanent meeting place. That will come if we stick together. All of the nineteen fine sports who played in the last City Tourney are counted upon to enter. Also, other members who missed the last tournament; as well as the several recent welcome visitors to the club,
