The Sacto Club had sixteen members present on Jan. 9, 1952, when we had our annual election of officers and business meeting. Sam Johnson was unanimously elected President, R. E. Russell moves into the Vice-Presidency and Gee is again Sec-Treas. Several minor matters were discussed. The major item of the evening turned out to be a vote to send the USCF a check for \$15.00 to aid the organization in its present financial difficulties. Steve Spaulding was appointed to conduct an enlistment campaign amongst members of the Sacto Club, for the USCF. We are sure that Steve will accomplish this with his usual enthusiasm.

A new feature introduced at the meeting was a "membership card" - at long last. When dues are paid, a member is given a receipt in form of a membership card duly signed by the club Treasurer, which entitles him to participate in all club doings. It also makes it easier to keep track of dues paid - and to what date. A sample card is enclosed to member-clubs of the CCCL, as it is possible they may be interested in a similar setup. The cards are relatively inexpensive to have printed.

at the last report of our finances we had a balance of \$74.62. We have collected some dues, all club support to the "News" (\$6 annually) has been received, and our "kitty" collections have done well too. After paying \$1.10 postage and sending \$15 to the USCF, we still have \$92.12 on hand. And we are happy to announce that the Sacramento Chess News is now on a "going" basis and costs the club nothing, due to receipts from subscriptions, club support in the League, and our weekly "kitty" collections. We hope this condition remains unchanged!

Congratulations are in order to Tournament Director R. E. Russell - how that man talks members into entering a tournament! With only 15 in the preliminary rounds, he now winds up with 12 in the championship finals, and another 12 in the Team Reserves tournament. And with prizes galore for both sections. We certainly hope the tournament lives up to your efforts in pronoting it, Russell. Also, we still have new members coming in and more and more checsplayers showing up for our weekly gatherings. If this continues, we will soon fill up the whole darned Tavern!

The Stockton club has appointed Ed LaBrie to get all news into the "Chess News" for publication, and Lee Kerfoot of Modesto is doing likewise for them. This is a good idea. Thy does not each member Club appoint one member to gather game scores (please check 'em!) and Club news and forward same to Chess News for publication? Cook and Forrest in Fresno are doing fine now in keeping us supplied with news of the Fresno Club, but we would like to hear more from Oakdale, San Jose, and Pittsburg. How about it, fellows?

This looks like an appropriate place to mention that the cost of this valuable (question marks galore) magazine is \$1 per year, on a calendar year basis that is. If you are a member of a club in good standing it is not necessary to subscribe as your Club receives copies to distribute. Sacto members receive copies as part of membership. BUT - if you are not a member of the Sacto club or in the CCCL, please renew your subscription as the list will be checked soon and delinquent names dropped. If in doubt about this matter, please drop us a line.

We would like to insert in our next issue a roster of the Clubs in the CCCL, containing such pertinent information as official club name, officers of club, meeting place and when, dues, annual tournaments held, etc. This would be very interesting to all, and perhaps other clubs can learn something from the way your club is handled. Jould all club Presidents take enough time out to send this in?

Here we are at the bottom of the page again. It might be well to call your attention to the fact that this is the <u>first</u> issue of Volume III (THREE THAT IS!) and we can all be mighty proud of that fact. The support is pleasing indeed, and while the "News" is on an informal basis of publication, sort of catch-as-catch-can, we would welcome constructive suggestions as to how it might be improved within the limits of our capabilities and finances. And Steve Spaulding is playing an S. Ryan (what's an Irishman doing over there in Herrie Old England?). Dick Chapman and Ed Westbrook are also playing for the Forty-Niners. Who's next?

Right now, Ken writes me he has a medium-strength player, G. Burton of 16 Sunny Bank, Worksop, Notts., England—who is just champing at the bit, waiting to get at one of these blooming Americanos. How about a medium-strength opponent for him?

And anybody else that wants a game, just write Ken Thorpe at address above in first paragraph—and drop me a card telling me you're playing. We figure to adjudicate all unfinished games on Earch 1, 1953. We are using the special "Airletter" form, ask for it by that name at postoffice. Costs ten cents and only takes 3 or 4 days enroute to England.

Tell Ken how strong you are—just be factual, not modest. And he can fix you up. It's a lot of fun, and you make friends while playing. Only one thing I ask of any player. You can play wild and lose or anything you wish—but be a good sportsman. Those British are just that, and we can be, too. So, in case of any dispute, give them the benefit of the doubt. You won't regret it.

Stockton match coming up! Reports reach me that Mattingly, Wolfe, Strob and that fighting gang of theirs are loaded for bear. They are planning a successful invasion of the Capital City-so, look out! ### R. E. Russell

The 1952 City Qualifying Tournament concluded with the final result and placings shown below. Winner of the trophy, — a tournament size bronze, chess king on pedestal — was J. B. Gee, who racked up his  $4\frac{1}{2}$  points against the strongest array faced by any competitor. It appears that the advent of new blood in the membership has provoked J. B. to snorting and pawing at the chess board with all his old time vigor — an omen as healthful as it is awesome.

Tied with Gee in points at  $4\frac{1}{2}$  but less fortunate in the drawings was Ii. O. Meyer, who is playing his usual brand of extra smooth chess. A good illustration was furnished in his fifth round win over Russell.

Third with a healthy 4 points was Ray Richards, well known by Bay Area chesslers as an able razzle-dazzler and dangerous as a pistol while his King retains its footing.

After a holiday recess, tournament play will be resumed beginning January 23, 7:30 pm at Ye Olde Tavern in the usual (growingly compelling) site. Up for decision will be the Sacramento City Championship and also a contest for the Team Reserves. Owing to some forced withdrawals amongst those qualifying for the City event and because of the late and welcome arrival of new members whose playing strength must surely have qualified, it has been found necessary to abandon the projected closed nature of the coming tournaments. Instead, anyone who played in the Qualifying event and who wishes to play in the City Tourney may do so. Rather than a closed Round-Robin this will again be a six round Swiss System Open as last year.

However, the Team Reserves contest will be held as planned, with the exception that new members of beginner strength will be invited to enter. Prizes will be awarded as advertised.

To this end, and in justice to those already supporting the possibility of a full prize list, to include a cup, trophy, and books for each event; it will be necessary to charge newcomers to either event an entrance fee of two dollars while to those having already subscribed, the additional fee will be one dollar.

Signs point to some furious activity on the winter chess front. Don't be left out. Register either at the regular club meeting or by postcard addressed to R. E. Pussell, P. O. Box 192, Auburn, California.

An apt suggestion has been received from Dr. David-Halig of San Jose, that we give appropriate nicknames to the various teams. Flynn has already used some: Sacramento Forty-Niners, Pittsburg Dons, Hodesto Hudhens. David-Halig further suggests such as Sacramento Solons, San Jose Saints, Hodesto Busters, Pittsburg Valiants. How about suggestions from some others and then all names could be submitted thru the "News" for a final vote by respective clubs.

In riding to Fresno Dec. 9th, for our third round play, the group had given considerable thought to Euwe's "Strategy is abstract, tactics are concrete"; -- Nimm witz's "Centralization, Restriction and Blockade"; -- Emanuel Lasker's "Develop Knights before Bishops"; Reuben Fine's "Pick the most suitable square for a piece and develop it there once and for all"; Dr. Tarrasch's "Chess, like love, like music, has the power to make men happy"; and as one of the group spoke up, "don't anyone fire until you see the white of their eyes". Still on the top of all this, as the afternoon wore along and the smoke of battle cleared, we found ourselves on the short end of a score  $3\frac{1}{2} - 2\frac{1}{2}$ , but convinced, the Fresno players are just swell, we had a fine time, P. Smith does like chess, and lastly San Jose had better be on their toes next March 16th, because Fresno is growing stronger with age.
