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Black plays the opening superbly, winning a whole Rook for his efforts, then inexplicably failers and returns most of the booty. Fortunately, a series of judicious exchanges suffices to convert his remaining material and positional advantage into a well-earned victory.

(a) Better than 3...N-B3, transposing into a Two Knights' Defense, since Black will now play P-Q4 unhindered.

(b) Only 4 N-B3 places serious obstacles in Black's path, although at the cost of a Pawn. The main line runs 4 N-B3 NxN 5 QPxN P-KB3 (forced, as 5...P-Q3 fails against 6 NxP! Q-K2! 7 BxPch K-Q1 8 0.0) 6 0.0 N-B3 7 N-R4 P-KN3 (7...N-K2? 8 B-Q3! P-KN3 9 P-KB4 B-N2 10 PxP PxP 11 B-KN5 P-B3 12 N-B5!, and White wins) 8 P-B4 P-B4 9 N-B3 (White loses a piece after 9 NxBP P-Q4.) P-K5 10 N-N5 B-B4ch 11 K-R1 Q-K2, and White's attack is broken leaving Black a Pawn up.

(c) Overlooking Black's strong reply. Correct is 6 P-Q3 N×P 7 N×P (superior to 7 B-N5ch P-B3 8 K×N Q-N3ch) K×N 8 Q×Nch Q-B3 9 Q×Qch P×Q 10 B-N3 N-B3 11 N-B3 N-Q5, with equality.

(d) White suffers a worse fate after 7 Q-N5ch P-B3! 8 QxNP QxNP 9 R-B1 B-KR6.

(e) If 9 P-N3, then Black simply retires his Knight to KB3.

(f) The alternative, 10 K—R1, loses the Queen after
10...N—N6ch! (not 10...N—B7ch? 11 QxN BxQ 12 PxQ, and
White escapes unscathed) 11 PxN QxQ.
(g) White was probably counting on 12...QxR 13 N—B3

(g) White was probably counting on 12...QxR 13 N—B3 Q—N7 14 PxP to keep his chances alive. Black has played this phase of the game faultlessly.

(h) But here Black has a fit of chess blindness that in other circumstances might spell his doom. White can safely resign after 14...N-Q2 15 QxP (or 15 BxB PxB 16 P-B5 P-K4 17 P-B6 PxP 18 RxP 0-0-0) 0-0.

(i) Trading Queens amounts to a lost ending: 19 QxQ RPxQ 20 RxP R—R8 21 R—Q1 R/1—R1 22 K—B1 R/1—R7 23 N—B3 RxRch 24 NxR RxP.

(j) If 30 QxKBP to avoid exchanging Queens, then 30...RxN wins out of hand.

(k) White's endgame prospects are nil, e.g., 38 RxNP R—Q8ch 39 R—N1 RxRch 40 KxR K—R2.

George Koltanowski, international chess master, will play 30 games of simultaneous chess against all comers, and then two games blindfolded, at the Recreation Hall, El Granada Mobile Homes Resort, in El Granada today from 2 to 6 p.m.

After his performance, Koltanowski will lecture on the controversial Bobby Fischer affair. Spectators to the exhibition and lecture will be admitted for \$1.
